RE: 2007 Historic Preservation Fund Pass-Through Grants

The State Historic Preservation Office (HPO) is now accepting applications for FY 2007 federal Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) matching grants. Eligible projects include architectural and archaeological surveys, nominations of eligible districts and properties to the National Register of Historic Places, survey publication manuscripts, local preservation design guidelines and preservation plans, educational programs, and restoration of properties listed in the National Register. Grants for restoration are very limited. Eligible applicants are local governments, nonprofit organizations, and educational institutions.

HPF grant funds may cover up to sixty per cent of project costs, and local matching funds must cover at least forty per cent. An estimated total of \$65,000 to \$70,000, depending on Congressional action, may be available for projects in Certified Local Government (CLG) areas. This amount is ten percent of the estimated HPF allocation to the state and is reserved for CLGs in accordance with federal requirements. A list of CLGs is attached. Funds also may be available for projects in non-CLG areas, although it is unlikely given the estimated HPF allocation. Eligible applicants in non-CLG areas are invited to submit applications with this understanding.

Grant projects are selected on a competitive basis. Grant awards usually range from \$1,500 to \$15,000. All grant projects must be completed by August 31, 2007.

The paper original and two paper copies of completed applications must be received by the HPO by January 31, 2007. Applications sent by email or fax will not be accepted.

There are two ways to apply for a CLG grant:

- 1) the CLG itself may initiate and submit an application to the HPO.
- 2) a nonprofit or educational institution may initiate an application for a project in a CLG's jurisdiction, but must work through the local preservation commission and local

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governing board which will submit the application to the HPO. A list of local CLG staff contacts is on the HPO web site at www.hpo.dcr.state.nc.us. **The initiating entity must submit the proposed application to the local commission by December 1, 2006**, to allow time for the commission and governing board to evaluate it and submit it with comments to the HPO by the January 31, 2007, deadline. If a grant is awarded for the project, the CLG will be the recipient of the grant and will administer the grant project.

In non-CLG areas, local governments apply directly to the HPO. Nonprofits and educational institutions apply directly or through the local government.

The enclosed application form and instructions can be used by both CLG and non-CLG applicants for all types of projects.

INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW

The Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) is a federal matching grant program made available to the State Historic Preservation Office (HPO) through the National Park Service, United States Department of the Interior. The HPO passes through a portion of the HPF funds to local applicants to support local preservation projects. Eligible applicants are Certified Local Governments (CLGs), non-certified local governments, nonprofit organizations, and educational institutions. The local matching requirement is a minimum of 40% of eligible project costs, and the HPF share is up to 60%. Eligible projects include architectural and archaeological surveys, National Register nominations, pre-development planning and restoration of National Register properties, survey publication manuscripts, local preservation design guidelines and preservation plans, and educational activities. All projects must address one or more draft goals in North Carolina's revised historic preservation plan. A copy of the draft goals is attached. **Priority will be given to projects involving completion of the statewide architectural and archaeological surveys.** Applications must be submitted to the HPO by **January 31, 2007**. All funded projects must be completed by August 2008. The application form is attached.

Total funding for HPF pass-through grants for local projects in 2007 is estimated to be between \$65,000 and \$70,000, depending on Congressional action. This amount represents ten percent of the estimated 2007 HPF allocation to North Carolina and is reserved for projects in municipalities and counties that participate in the Certified Local Government (CLG) program, in accordance with federal requirements. A list of CLGs is attached. It is unlikely that funding will be available for projects in non-CLG areas. Eligible applicants in non-CLG areas may submit applications with this understanding.

Proposed projects may be included in the HPO's annual application to the National Park Service for the HPF allocation to the state. For this purpose, applicants may be asked to submit additional information.

SPECIAL DEADLINES FOR PROJECTS IN CLG AREAS

CLGs apply directly to the HPO. A nonprofit or educational institution may initiate an application for a project in a CLG's jurisdiction, but must work through the local preservation commission and local governing board which will submit the application to the HPO. STANDARDS AND GUIDELINES

- All projects must address one or more of the draft goals in North Carolina's revised comprehensive historic preservation plan. Reference to specific goals and objectives and a statement of how the project will accomplish them should be included in the Abstract of the Proposed Project (Part III of Application Form). The draft goals are attached.
- Activities funded under this program will be performed in compliance with the applicable Secretary of the Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Archeology and Historic Preservation* and shall be conducted under the supervision of the State Historic Preservation Office.
- Professional qualifications of the staff, consultants, or principal investigators undertaking grant projects must meet the applicable minimal federal professional qualifications in 36 CFR 61.
- All federal grant applications include an Equal Opportunity Statement form, which must be completed and returned with the application. Applications without this form will not be considered for funding.
- Grant funds may pay up to 60% of total project costs. The nonfederal matching share must pay at least 40% of project costs.
- Federal and state standards and accounting procedures apply to the grant funds and matching share. Non-governmental entities must comply with accountability and reporting requirements of North Carolina General Statute 143-6.2.

SELECTION CRITERIA

All proposals will be reviewed and evaluated on the basis of the following:

- contribution to statewide architectural or archaeological inventory of historic resources
- comprehensive planning considerations
- soundness of project application, including budget, clarity, feasibility, local commitment
- number and quality of resources in project area

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS AND ACTIVITIES

Eligible Applicants:

Local governments, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, and Certified Local Governments (CLGs). A list of CLGs is attached. Information on the current status of a CLG certification may be obtained from Mary Ruffin Hanbury, CLG coordinator, at (919) 733-4763 x247.

Eligible Activities:

Survey and Planning. Priority consideration for funding will be given to projects for comprehensive architectural or archaeological surveys and nominations of eligible properties or districts to the National Register of Historic Places. Preservation planning activities, development of educational materials and activities, and preparation of publishable manuscripts from approved architectural surveys are also eligible for consideration. Publication of surveys, museum exhibits, and research usually are not funded.

Predevelopment projects for properties listed in the National Register may include archaeological

investigations, architectural plans and specifications, engineering services, or feasibility studies for restoration.

Development projects for properties listed in the National Register may include archaeological excavations or restoration/rehabilitation of historic resources. Structures or sites must be listed in the National Register of Historic Places, either individually or as a contributing property within a National Register historic district. Preservation Agreements are required for all grant-assisted development projects. Deed Covenants are required on an escalating scale for development grants in excess of \$10,000. These time-limited covenants are recorded with the deed to the property.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Projects in CLG Areas: CLGs apply directly to the HPO. A nonprofit or educational institution may initiate an application for a project in a CLG's jurisdiction, but must work through the local preservation commission and local governing board which must agree to submit the application to the HPO. A list of local CLG staff contacts is on the HPO web site at www.hpo.dcr.state.nc.us. **The initiating entity must contact the local CLG staff in October, 2006, to discuss the project and must submit the proposed application to the local commission by December 1, 2006,** to allow time for the commission and governing board to evaluate it and submit it with comments to the HPO by the January 31, 2007, deadline. If a grant is awarded for the project, the CLG will be the recipient of the grant and will administer the grant project.

Projects in Non-CLG Areas: Local governments apply directly to the HPO. Nonprofits and educational institutions may apply directly or through the local government.

Mail the paper original and two paper copies of applications to: Grants Supervisor, State Historic Preservation Office, 4617 Mail Service Center, Raleigh, NC 27699-4617. **Applications sent by fax or e-mail will not be accepted.**

Grant awards will be announced in March, 2007. The grant recipient and the Office of Archives and History will sign a grant contract (grant agreement). Then the grant recipient will procure a consultant or principle investigator and execute a project contract. The HPO will prepare the contract documents and will ensure that all services and products meet federal and state standards, while the grant recipient will coordinate and administer the grant project. All projects should be under a project contract by August, 2007, but in any event, no later than September 30, 2007.

Projects must be completed by August 31, 2008.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- Disbursement of grant funds is on a cost reimbursement basis.

DRAFT GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

NORTH CAROLINA HISTORIC PRESERVATION PLAN FOR 2006-2010

The following five goals and their associated objectives represent the consensus of the State Historic Preservation Office (HPO) staff, members of the HPO's Public Advisory Committee, and the state's citizens and community leaders who helped create the draft North Carolina Historic Preservation Plan for 2006-2010. The plan is scheduled for completion in the fall of 2006.

Goals and Objectives

I. Outreach and Communication: create a strong preservation network that shares successes and information with a variety of audiences through technology and targeted public relations.

Establish a strong preservation network, supported by technology, to include a wide spectrum of parties, for the purpose of improved, proactive and efficient communication.

Continue to make preservation data available on-line (programmatic data, survey data, funding information, basic preservation information), create links to other relevant preservation resources and continue to review and revise on-line presence.

Reach out and communicate preservation information and success stories to a wide population including non-traditional partners and audiences.

Launch a public education/awareness campaign to establish the image of preservation in North Carolina. Give the movement relevance by publishing among other things the economic benefits of preservation. Launch a public relations and "branding" campaign for preservation.

Institute a standing statewide Preservation Advisory Committee.

II. Education: create new educational opportunities and support existing programs for citizens, students, leaders, professionals and elected officials.

Provide training on a variety of topics specifically for decision makers at the state and local levels including elected officials and preservation and planning commission members and staff.

Work with established educational institutions and preservation partners to develop formal programs in preservation (including as it relates to architecture, planning and public administration), cultural resource management, and in the preservation-related building trades.

Create a task force to examine technical issues and develop curriculum/training and technical briefings.

Make educational opportunities available to citizens in their own communities through partnership and technology.

Explore heritage education at the secondary level.

Development and implement a mentoring program for preservation commission and non profits.

III. Advocacy and Policy: make preservation a key public policy objective supported by well organized and informed advocacy.

Create a grassroots advocacy network which will coordinate legislative updates, briefing materials, and events.

Examine specific public policy issues such as a rehabilitation building code, governmental office and school locations, archaeological protection policies, stewardship of publicly owned buildings, enforcement of existing laws and policies, and tax credits and incentives for small projects.

Revise and widely distribute existing state preservation economic impact study and encourage creation of local preservation economic impact studies.

IV. Leadership and capacity: increase the capacity of preservation organizations and the private sector to engage in preservation by fostering strong leadership and management.

Use appropriate technology for mapping, record keeping and communication and seek out resources to maintain technology.

Seek out new, inventive and dependable sources of funding for preservation projects and programs.

Improve visibility of preservation programs and increase accessibility to programs and people.

Examine and assess preservation their programs, processes, and services to insure they are operating efficiently and effectively and if not, to seek out ways to improve them.

Develop a strategic plan to increase preservation leadership and capacity statewide.

V. Identification and evaluation: Continue to develop comprehensive survey data for historic resources throughout the state; evaluate the resources that are known; and make this information accessible.

Explore initiatives especially among state agencies and non-traditional partnerships, to secure resources to increase survey and National Register data and make it available, particularly via digital means.

Identify thematic and geographic survey and nomination needs in under-surveyed localities and those with older surveys and work to strategically secure resources to address them.

Work to integrate historic resource data within state and local governments' GIS systems.
