Mr. Randall is incorrect. Our contractor has NOT been chipping dead trees in the proposed Botanical Garden Foundation property (1.0 ac.). The contractor has been chipping dead trees on the lots. The past hurricanes and ice storm produced significant quantities of deadfall that we have been chipping at the site. We believed that the most responsible way to deal with the debris was to grind up the trees and return the chips back to the lots. The only disturbance in the 1 acre Botanical Garden parcel is the sanitary sewer easement that has been installed already. This is complete and we do not expect to go back in that area except to seed and stabilize. Incidentally, Mr. Randall called me 2 weeks ago and asked me how we planned to stabilize the sanitary sewer easement on the BGF property. I stated that the typical procedure for stabilization in winter months is rye grass with fescue. He asked me if we could use native species of grass. I told him we would gladly comply with his request and I asked our contractor to call Mr. Randall to find out exactly what species of grass he wanted and to find out where to buy this seed. I have worked very hard to foster open communication and cooperation throughout the entire approval process of this subdivision. It is important to me personally and professionally that this project is done well and that is my main concern. I will personally walk this boundary with Mr. Randall and anyone else interested in this issue. I am always available for any questions, comments, and yes, even criticism. -Warren 932-4567.
