Bike to Work Week and Bike to Work Day

Recommendation

The Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Board requests the Town Council to adopt a resolution supporting Bike to Work Week, May 16-20, 2005, and Bike to Work Day, Friday, May 20, 2005. The Board would also like to work with the Chamber of Commerce to promote Bike to Work Week and to encourage local business owners to provide bike racks.

Background

Encouraging residents to commute by bicycle is an important component of the Town Council's recently adopted Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan and can help reduce traffic congestion and pollution and address obesity. Bike to Work Week and Bike to Work Day are part of a nationwide campaign by the League of American Bicyclists to encourage people to leave their cars at home and use their bicycles for commuting and shopping. In addition to encouraging people to commute by bicycle, it is important for local businesses to provide bicycle parking for employees and customers. The Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Board has identified a number of local businesses that do not have bicycle parking (see attached list). The Chamber of Commerce would be helpful in contacting and convincing local businesses to offer these facilities.

Specific Steps Requested

- 1. Pass a resolution declaring May 16-20, 2005 Bike to Work Week and May 20, 2005 Bike to Work Day:
- 2. Provide resources in terms of staff time and promotional material to promote these events;
- 3. Request that UNC promote these events to university employees;
- 4. Request that the Chamber of Commerce work with the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Board to contact local businesses and encourage their employees to bike to work on these days and to provide bicycle parking for their employees and customers.
