THE MOTION WAS CARRIED BY A VOTE OF SIX TO TWO WITH ALDERMEN COHEN EPTING, HOWES, MARSHALL, SILVER, AND SMITH SUPPORTING AND ALDERMEN GARDNER AND VICKERY OPPOSING.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting

Preliminary Resolution of Intent to Pave Chase Avenue and Portions of Markham Drive, Markham Court, and Old Oxford Road

Mayor Wallace announced that a public hearing was to be held on the paving of Chase Avenue and portions of Markham Drive, Markham Court, and Old Oxford Drive; however, inadvertently the proper notice was not published. The manager had suggested a resolution be adopted setting another public hearing on the matter for October 10, 1977, at 7:30 p.m., and that item 10b "Accepting Bids and Awarding of Contract" for the paving be deferred until after the public hearing. ALDERMAN GARDNER MOVED, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN SMITH, ADOPTION OF THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION.

A PRELIMINARY RESOLUTION OF INTENT TO PAVE CHASE AVENUE AND PORTIONS OF MARKHAM DRIVE, MARKHAM COURT, AND OLD OXFORD ROAD

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill that the Board is considering undertaking the paving with curb and gutter of Chase Avenue from its dead-end to Columbia Street, Markham Drive from Tadley Drive to Old Oxford Road; Markham Court from Markham Drive to its dead-end; and Old Oxford Road from Markham Drive to Ridgecrest Drive.

It is anticipated that the basis for assessing said project costs against the abutting property owners shall be 50% of the total cost on a pro rata front-foot basis; and that the excess above said assessed 50% of the total costs shall be borne by the Town.

The amount of said assessment may be paid in full without interest at any time before the expiration of 30 days after the date that the notice of confirmation of said assessment has been published, or may be paid in 10 equal annual installments each bearing interest on the unpaid balance at the rate of 6% per annum from the date of said confirmation, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill, that a public hearing is hereby called on this proposed project on the 10th day of October, 1977, in the Meeting Room of the Municipal Building, Chapel Hill, North Carolina at 7:30 o'clock p.m., and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that at least 10 days before date set for said public hearing, that notice of said hearing and the adoption of the preliminary resolution be published in the Chapel Hill Newspaper, and that a copy of said notice be mailed by first-class mail at least 10 days prior to said hearing to all property owners whose property may be subject to assessment by reason of this project as shown on the County Tax Records.

This the 12th day of September, 1977.

THE MOTION WAS CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Minutes

Alderman Marshall moved, seconded by Alderman Epting, that consideration of the minutes of July 25, 1977, be deferred until September 26, as her copy was unreadable. On motion by Alderman Smith, seconded by Alderman Howes, the minutes of July 18, 1977 were approved. On motion by Alderman Smith, seconded by Alderman Marshall, the minutes of August 4, 1977, were approved.

Petitions and Requests

Mayor Wallace stated that Dr. Eugene Grace had requested to speak to the Board regarding the appeal of the decision of Judge Gordon on the B. Everett Jordan dam case, but could not get to the meeting until later. He had told Dr. Grace he would be recognized when he arrived. The Board agreed.

Alderman Vickery requested that the report on the status of the Comprehensive Plan and the report on the status of the Durham County Tax Evaluation be heard after consideration of Laketree, as there were people in the audience who might wish to hear these. There were probably not many citizens in the audience for the other items.

Mayor Wallace announced that a letter from Agatha Johnson had been received, notifying the Board that the hearing on the extraterritorial jurisdictional request had been set for October 4, 1977, at 7:30 p.m., in the cultural arts building at the high school.

Mr. Jenne requested the Board to add an item, 13e, notification of a vacancy on the Historic District Commission, to the agenda.

Consideration of proposed Laketree Development

Mr. Bob Midgette distributed a memorandum to the Board from Ms. Sylvia Rodin and Ms. Gertrude Groten proposing three more stiuplations be added to the applications. In these stipulations, the developers would agree to reduce the heated floor area of the shopping center and the office park by 25 per cent, revise the special use permit for the office park so that only one office building was permitted until after 1980, and give the Board authority to prevent any work on the office park or shopping center until the Board believed adequate water and sewer to be available.

Alderman Cohen asked if Ms. Parker wished to make any comments on the development. Ms. Parker responded that the Planning Board had reviewed the development again at their last meeting in July. They had done their best to secure good management growth techniques through the special use, master plan and phasing plan.

Alderman Howes repeated his concerns over the water and sewer availability and the traffic impact on the project. He thought approval of the development would be premature. The Economic Development Administration had not approved the plans for water from Hillsborough. The Town has agreement problems with an intergovernmental over the wastewater treatment plant. A thoroughfare plan was needed to help the backup traffic on the by-pass and on Pittsboro Street. These problems needed to be solved before approval of the project. Alderman Howes stated he was disappointed that the Planning Board had not considered how the community could create a device whereby they could achieve the kind of control the Board wanted in this type of development.

Alderman Marshall said the request made to the Planning Board was unreasonable. She felt the Planning Board had done an excellent job and was only asking the Board to be consistent with what had been approved before. With water coming from Durham and Hillsborough, she did not believe water to be a problem. The new part of the treatment plant would take care of Chapel Hill's problems for a little while. The Department of Transportation would wait until the traffic was very bad before they would do anything to correct the situation. The property could be developed without approval and put more traffic on the highway without any road improvements.

Alderman Cohen stated that added together the small developments which had been approved would have more impact than Laketree. Small subdivisions with dead end roads increased the use of cars as it was too expensive to put transportation in those areas. Laketree was of a density which would make public transportation feasible. An increase in employment would be served by building. Laketree proposed condominiums and apartments affordable by blue collar workers.

Alderman Vickery endorsed the statements by Alderman Cohen and Marshall. He thought the Board should accept the recommendation of the Planning Board, Appearance Commission and staff to approve Laketree. He thought voting against the project would be a statement against the boards the Aldermen asked for advice.

Alderman Silver disagreed that voting against the project would say anything about the boards and commissions. There were many questions on the shortage of resources. He wanted to protect the people already in the community. The application could not be used as a legal imposition on the developers. Alderman Silver agreed with the Planning Board that a water allocation system was needed. Imposing on already scarce resources would be a hazard to the community.

Alderman Gardner stated that much growth was going on in the community, especially in the medical complex. The stipulations recommended by the Planning Board gave credence that community concerns had been considered. This was the way to achieve planned or quality growth.

Alderman Epting noted that the project was a good one, but that he would vote against it because of the concerns presented before.

Alderman Smith stated that Chapel Hill had given lip service to the idea of planned growth but had done nothing about those things connected with planned growth such as water and sewer service and highways. He had asked Secretary Bradshaw to get on with the thoroughfare plan, but had not received much response. The Board had not considered the impact of Carrboro and the enlarged planning jurisdiction on the water and sewer. The Town had not fulfilled its responsibility in putting in streets to take traffic out of town and around it.

ALDERMAN SMITH MOVED, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN SILVER, ADOPTION OF THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION.

A RESOLUTION DISAPPROVING THE LAKETREE MASTER PLAN AND PHASING PLAN AS GUIDES FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENT OF THE LAKETREE AREA

A RESOLUTION DENYING A UNIFIED BUSINESS SPECIAL USE PERMIT TO S. RODIN AND G. GROTEN FOR THE LAKETREE OFFICE PARK AND SHOPPING CENTER

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill that the Board hereby fails to find upon the evidence presented that the proposed Special Use Permit requested by S. Rodin and G. Groten for the Laketree Office Park and Laketree Center:

Will not materially endanger the public health or safety if located where proposed and developed according to the plan as submitted and approved.

This the 12th day of September, 1977.

This was due to the unavailability of water and sewer and the traffic impact on an overburdened highway. Alderman Cohen stated the shopping center would serve some of the people in northern Chatham County thereby decreasing some of the traffic. Alderman Marshall did not believe there would be a shortage of water when the new Durham plant is completed.

Also, the sewer allocation system is on a "first-come, first serve" basis, and if the town refused Laketree because of sewer it would be discriminating. In response to Mr. Denny's question, Alderman Epting stated he was not addressing any of the other findings, in harmony, and conformance the conditions and specifications or land values, for the special use permits. THE MOTION WAS CARRIED BY A VOTE OF FIVE TO FOUR WITH ALDERMEN EPTING, HOWES, SILVER AND SMITH AND MAYOR WALLACE SUPPORTING AND ALDERMEN COHEN, GARDNER, MARSHALL AND VICKERY OPPOSING.

Ms. Parker asked the Board of Aldermen to give the Planning Board some guidance in future evaluations of subdivisions as they felt the water and sewer shortages were more severe than assurances from OWASA saying they could provide both showed. The Board discussed when this should be considered. It was decided that the Mayor and Ms. Parker would confer and try to set a time within the next few weeks for a worksession. Copies of documents from other areas of the country which have phased development because of the same type of problems would be made available before this worksession.

Report on the Comprehensive Plan:

Ms. Parker explained that the map for the land use plan was being presented. Supportive documents were still being prepared. The planning staff hoped to have them by October 10. Mr. Jennings stated the essential decisions for the land use plan were made on February 14. However, before transferring these to a map, the Planning Board had felt a program of citizen participation should take place. The plan uses a subcommunities concept in evaluating existing land use, facilities, transportation systems and interworkings. The subcommunities are outlined by throughfares, have recreational facilities in the center and are serviced by commercial facilities. Areas had been outlined for commercial expansion, new commercial centers and new open space in the future. Alderman Smith thought the Planning Board should be considering the thoroughfare plan before planning for higher density in areas. Alderman Howes asked that when the Planning Board presented the land use plan for adoption, they talk about each of the sectors.

Report on the Status of the Durham County Property Evaluation

The report was distributed. None of the Aldermen had questions on it.

Petition from Dr. Eugene Grace

Dr. Grace petitioned the Board to reconsider its decision to appeal Judge Gordon's decision in the B. Everett Jordan case. He had spoken to the Durham City Council on the same request. Their objection to filling the dam as many of the residents of Chapel Hill had requested, was the possible higher cost of sewage treatment. Dr. Grace stated the federal government was liable for extraordinary costs resulting from

its projects. If some of these costs were passed on to the cities of Chapel Hill and Durham, they would be made up in the benefits received from industry, business, and the increased quality of residential life. The lake could meet the need for flood control, recreation and water supply and improve the environment. Additional studies and appeals would cost taxpayers unnecessarily. In Dr. Grace's opinion, Chapel Hill and Durham should clean up their effluent. Resources were on the way for point sources and education would help prevent nonpoint sources of pollution. Metals entering the rivers could be monitored and controlled.

ALDERMAN EPTING MOVED, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN GARDNER, THAT THE BOARD ACCEPT THE PETITION. THE MOTION WAS CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Resolution Setting Hours for Glass Recycling

ALDERMAN COHEN MOVED, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN SMITH, ADOPTION OF THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION.

Resolution Granting a Unified Business Special Use Permit for the Municipal Operations Facility at Airport Road with Stipulations

ALDERMAN SILVER MOVED, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN SMITH, ADOPTION OF THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION.

A RUSOLUTION GRANTING A UNIFIED DUSINESS SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR THE MUNICIPAL OPERATIONS FACILITY AT AIRPORT ROAD WITH STIPULATIONS

BD IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill that the Board hereby finds that the Municipal Operations Facility if developed in accordance with the plans submitted to the Board for approval and the stipulations and conditions set forth below:

- will not materially endanger the public health or safety if located where proposed and developed according to the plan as submitted and approved,
- 2. meets all required conditions and specifications,
- 3. will not substantially injure the value of adjoining or abutting property, and is a public necessity, and,
 - 4. that the location and character of the use if developed according to the plan as submitted and approved will be in harmony with the area in which it is to be located and in general conformity with the plan of development of Chapel Hill and its environs.

The stipulations upon which the above findings are based are as follows:

- That the existing trees along the south side of the entrance road be retained and that these trees be protected during construction with appropriate fencing.
- 2. That the entrance road connecting with Airport Road (that portion of the road running in an east-west orientation) be paved to a minimum width of 24 feet, and that the access roads into the Public Works area and the Animal Shelter area (such roads are both oriented in a north-south direction) be paved to a minimum width of 24 feet.
- 3. That an earth berm having a minimum height of 12 feet be constructed within the 100 foot buffer and parallel to Airport Road along that portion of the site not having adequate existing planting to totally screen the site and the proposed municipal structures. All existing trees and vegetation within the 100 foot buffer shall be retained except for that to be removed for the three access points shown on the site plan prepared by the applicant. Landscaping for the berm shall be of a height sufficient to screen all proposed structures and shall be shown on the Landscape Plan. Construction and adequacy of the earth berm shall be determined by the Town Manager.
- 4. That the Town request the Department of Transportation to repaint the lines or take other measures necessary on that portion of Airport Road located north of Estes Drive to provide five (5) lanes one of which would be a center turning lane.
- That the curb radii of the entrance road at its intersection with Airport Road be flured.

- 6. That prior to issuance of a building permit a detailed landscape and sign plan shall be submitted to and approved by the Appearance Commission. Such landscape plan may be submitted in phases corresponding to the development phasing plan in which case a detailed landscape plan shall be submitted prior to obtaining a building permit for any building within the phase. The landscape plan shall include, but not be limited to, a precise delineation of natural growth to remain, screening of the recycling area and location of utility lines. Such landscape plan shall include landscaping of the access road from Airport Road to the site of the animal shelter.
- 7. That prior to issuance of a building permit, detailed architectural plans shall be submitted to and approved by the Appearance Commission. Such elevations may be submitted in phases corresponding to the development phasing plan, in which case detailed architectural plans shall be submitted prior to issuance of a building permit for any building within the phase. Architectural plans shall specify materials, color, and exterior elevations.
- 8. That fire hydrants be located and installed as approved by the Town Manager. There shall be a minimum of three hydrants on the site.
- 9. That construction begin by October 1, 1978 and be completed by October 1, 1985.
- 10. That a revised site plan incorporating the special use stipulations be submitted to the Planning Department prior to issuance of a building permit.
- 11. That the applicant prepare a site development and improvements program for the 24 acre site, showing phasing of all improvements. Such plan shall be submitted prior to issuance of a building permit.
- 12. That a minimum 3 foot high earth berm be constructed on the north and east sides of the Animal Shelter. Such berm to be shown on the landscape plan.
- 13. That the Department of Public Works office building be separated from the Buildings and Grounds Garage by a minimum distance of 20 feet.

THE MOTION WAS CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Resolution Authorizing Condemnation of a Greenways Easement

Mr. Drake pointed out the subject property which was proposed as part of the greenways system. The Dickerson Court property was to be used because it was virtually impossible to follow along the creek all the way. Mr. Drake was requesting authority to file condemnation papers. Mr. Kutz did not want bicycle traffic running through this small residential area. There were children who played in the street and elderly persons who frequently walked along this way as well as having gardens there. Mr. Jenne stated the greenways sytem had been studied. Alternatives for this route had been carefully reviewed. Alderman Gardner asked Mr. Kutz if he would provide the easement if the problem of the bikes was solved. The greenways had first been mentioned as a walking path. Mr. Kutz said he would not have much objection if the bikes were not to be allowed. Alderman Smith stated he would rather have the path fenced off than take the bikes off. Alderman Howes did not believe there would be much bike traffic there. Alderman Gardner wanted a walking scenic trail with water fountains and benches, but no bikes. Alderman Howes suggested this was a policy question which should be addressed separately. ALDERMAN HOWES MOVED, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN EPTING ADOPTION OF THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CONDEMNATION OF A GREENWAYS EASEMENT (DICKERSON COURT)

Resolution Authorizing the Submission of BOR Grants

ALDERMAN GARDNER MOVED, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN SILVER, ADOPTION OF THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE DEVELOPMENT OF HARGRAVES PARK BY THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL BOARD OF ALDERHEN

WHEREAS, the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 provides for the making of grants by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Department of Interior of the United States Government to States and to local municipalities in support of Cutdoor Recreation projects and such funds are available after approval of the appropriate State Agency and the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation; and

WHEREAS, the State is required to insure that there will be no discrimination against any person of any race, color, sex, creed, or political affiliation; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill realizes that recreation facilities are not adequate to meet the minimum recreational needs of the people of Chapel Hill; and

WHEREAS, it is believed that said Board with the assistance of the general public is not in a position to lend full support to the development of a Hargraves Park.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL, NORTH CAROLINA:

- (1) That an application be made to the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Department of Interior of the U.S. Government through the State of North Carolina for a development grant of \$100,170.00 which represents fifty percent (50%) of all costs including preparation, plans, and construction of recreational facilities to be completed in the fiscal year 1977-78.
- (2) That the Town Manager of the Town of Chapel Hill be authorized and directed to file such application on behalf of the Town of Chapel Hill, to provide additional information and to furnish such documents as may be required by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and the State of North Carolina and to act as the authorized correspondent of the Town of Chapel Hill.
- (3) That the Director, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Department of Interior of the United States Government be, and hereby is assured of full compliance by the applicant with the regulations promulgated pursuant to Title VI of Civil Rights Act of 1964.

This the 12th day of September, 1977.

Alderman Vickery asked if submission of these grants would delay implementation of the projects. Mr. Jenne answered that it would delay them for

approximately 3 to 4 months. Alderman Vickery then asked if the Recreation Commission had approved. Mr. Hall responded that the Commission had reviewed the grant and approved it. Mr. Jennings stated the Commission had not seen the actual application. Alderman Vickery asked if they were aware of the four month delay. Mr. Hall believed they were. Alderman Vickery wanted a formal recommendation from the Recreation Commission and moved that approval of the application be delayed and referred to the Recreation Commission for a report back on the 26th. ALDERMAN GARDNER SECONDED THE MOTION. Mayor Wallace asked if the application could be approved subject to the Commission's meeting and approving it. Alderman Vickery agreed to this. Mr. Jenne stated the chairman of the Commission was definitely aware of the implications of the application submission. He did not know if every member was aware. Alderman Smith did not think the Board should delay the application. Mr. Hall explained that the application was actually due on September 1, and that if it was not approved by September 15, it would not be sent forward. Alderman Silver suggested the application could be approved and if any compelling reason developed, it could later be refused. ALDERMAN COHEN MOVED THE QUESTION, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN HOWES. DEBATE WAS CEASED BY UNANIMOUS CONSENT. THE SUBSTITUTE MOTION WAS DEFFATED BY A VOTE OF SIX TO TWO WITH ALDERMEN GARDNER AND VICKERY SUPPORTING AND ALDERMEN COHEN, EPTING, HOWES, MARSHALL, SILVER AND SMITH OPPOSING.
