I hope Town Council will support and implement the Bike and Ped Action Plan. As Transportation Board Liaison I was able to attend most of the Task Force meetings and I am very pleased with the final product. I believe this is a missing piece in our transportation puzzle. I think you will find a number of parts that can and should be implemented this year. The plan reiterates some of the ideas presented to Council by the T-Board in the past to connect neighborhoods and to improve intersections.

I'd like to mention several ideas which may not be specifically mentioned in the

plan but I hope Council is familiar with and will support.

1. Can the Town reverse some of the recent DOT changes. I have noticed that recent repaving projects have made travel lanes wider, narrowed bike lanes or shoulders, created long strips of center turn lanes and created intersections with 2 or 3 turn lanes. All of this makes it tougher for cyclists on the road and pedestrians trying to cross the street.

2. Where trees already exist please have the sidewalks wind under the trees. Where trees are missing please plant shade trees. In other words don't replicate the sidewalk design on

Mason Farm Rd by the new family Housing.

3. Please note that one of the missions of our Greenways is to connect parts of town. 4. Connectivity is very important thus the intersection studies are vital. The current DOT policy to require a lot of pedestrian traffic before making intersection improvements is not

helpful. 5. Too many intersections in Chapel Hill have only 2 or 3 crosswalks. There needs to

always be 4 crosswalks at the intersections.

6. The town should do more to encourage the installation of bike racks and sidewalks at older business. For example the Estes Post Office lacks a bike rack as do the older shopping centers.

7. Given the state proposals to turn Fordham Boulevard into a six lane highway I hope special attention will be given to package 1. If we don't make efforts now to connect

neighborhoods we will only be able to reach parts of town by car.

8. With increased sidewalks and bike facilities come greater responsibilities to maintain them. Personally I think we the property owners need to make sure sidewalks and sides of roads are clear. In other words sidewalks and bike lanes should not have piled up leaves, brush, snow, overgrown grass, overhanging limbs, trash cans etc. blocking them. Could the town manager remind the public the procedures for reporting problems with sidewalks?

Dear Sirs and Mesdames:

We will be unable to attend tonight's public hearing on the Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan, but we would like to comment:

Chapel Hill residents are already taxed disproportionately highly because so much real property in our town belongs to UNC and is therefore tax-exempt. We do not think it is proper to use town funds to make "improvements" to university property, as is proposed to happen in the paving of the Battle Branch Trail for use of cyclists.

We would be happy to see merely the removal of invasive exotic vegetation and of encroaching poison ivy, as is planned by NCBG's Steve Keith, who will take over this area of university land, and provision of, say, simple wooden bridges over a few tricky stream crossings on the trail.

The Greenway system already provides a paved path to the community center on Estes Drive, via the Bolin Creek floodplain. This path is used by cyclists, rollerbladers, and pedestrians. We really appreciate having an alternative with a wilder character in Battle Branch Trail. This way, we don't have to get out the car in order to have a true woodland experience in Chapel Hill.

Thank you for providing the Chapel Hill Carrboro City Schools the opportunity to review and comment on the proposed Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan. The district has long supported and had as a priority the development of safe walk zones with pedestrian and bicycle access to our schools.

The Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan (p. 16-17) proposes the paving of the Battle Branch Greenway Trail, to create an "off-road" bicycle transportation corridor through the heart of the Park where the natural trail now runs. We emphatically oppose this project.

For more than 100 years, Battle Branch Woods has been a place of sanctuary and serenity where people could be a part of nature. It has never been plowed, never been disturbed. We have seen deer, raccoons, possums, great horned owls, pileated woodpeckers, red foxes, and other animals in these woods. It is a place of wildlife, often crossing a few feet in front of us. It is a very fragile ecosystem, with rare plants and trees more than 200 years old. At a recent meeting of the Greenways Commission, the representative of the University of North Carolina described the Woods as "sacred ground."

The paving of the natural trail would require the destruction of very old timber trees, destruction of wildlife habitat, the "recontouring" of steep slopes that lie within 10 feet of Battle Creek (a perennial stream), and other enormous environmental damage. It mean the destruction of the last remaining, undisturbed, natural place in the heart of Chapel Hill.

We support thoughtful improvements to the trail that retain its natural surface. We are opposed to any paving project through the Woods. We urge the Town Council to preserve Battle Park as a natural surface trail, so that our children and future generations will be able to experience the ageless beauty of one of Chapel Hill's very last remaining wild places.

Subject: Please don't pave the hiking path in Battle Park Woods!

Dear Members of Council,

I am sorry that I will not able to attend your meeting on Monday, September 20, at which you will be discussing the "Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan" for Chapel Hill.

I strongly support improved bike-friendly roads. I ride my bike around town several times each month, including a short distance on Battle Branch trail. However, I am OPPOSED to paving Battle Branch trail.

Our town has very few soft surface hiking trails. Many of the people who jog or walk along Battle Branch trail choose to do so because it is a soft surface and therefore has a character that is very different from the paved Bollin Creek pathway. It also is relatively quiet and peaceful; although mountain bikes are allowed, the path currently is not very conducive to biking. Its undeveloped character provides a good deal of its charm — you can walk from the UNC campus to the Community Center and almost forget that you're in the middle of town.

I am in favor of maintaining and improving the Battle Branch trail. It does need maintenance: There are spots where erosion has washed away the bed of the path, making it hard for some people to negotiate the path on foot. The boardwalk is in need of repair in several places. Some of the paths that lead down to the trail could benefit from some trimming and grading (e.g., the paths that lead down to Battle Branch from Gimghoul and from Glendale). However, paving the path would take us too far in the opposite direction; it would homogenize this part of the Greenway with the other segments, depriving the community of some of the diversity which makes it so attractive.

I do have a suggestion for an addition to your list of "off road paths."

It would be very helpful if there were some way for bikes and pedestrians to get from the end of Fern (which is the access road along the north side of 15-501 bypass) to Raleigh Road. The only way to do that now is to walk along the 15-501 shoulder, facing traffic, until you get to the on-ramp coming up from Raleigh Road. At present Fern Road ends in a chain link fence that is overgrown with hedge and vines; were there a passage through that



fence, one could easily walk or ride down to Raleigh Road. This would simplify a very attractive loop route which would take one up Raleigh Road to Country Club, left onto Ridge and then onto Laurel Hill, down to Fern, and back to Raleigh Road.

Subject: Comments on 2004 Draft Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan


The Draft Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan proposes a series of sidewalks connecting Airport Road and Piney Mountain Road through the North Forest Hills neighborhood. This network of sidewalks has been placed in the third category (the lowest), a priority we think is appropriate considering the limited traffic in the neighborhood. Thus these sidewalks may not be constructed for several years, as many others are higher priority.

The proposed route meets the criteria of the action plan. However sidewalks on one section of Dixie Drive deserve closer examination. The portion of Dixie Drive between Cynthia Drive and Seminole Drive contains a section with steep banks and shoulders of only 3' and 5'. That section would require extensive reinforcement of the bank to provide a space wide enough for construction of a sidewalk.

Two alternate routes are available that also meet your criteria. The first is Collums Road that would also serve our neighborhood park. The second is Cynthia Drive that would also serve the current bus route A. Each of these avoids the narrow section of Dixie Drive.

A second concern of the neighborhood is the inclusion of curbs, gutters and drains as part of the sidewalk construction. These features concentrate the rainfall into focused paths, which can lead to increased runoff entering Lake Ellen with possible erosion and silting. To mitigate the potential of runoff we urge the construction of sidewalks without curbs, gutters, or drains. A sidewalk without these features but with grass or natural borders will allow a smooth flow of rainfall from the street with less potential for runoff to enter the lake. Regardless of the route through the neighborhood, the sidewalks should not include curbs, gutters, or drains.

Adoption of these modifications to the sidewalk plan through the North Forest Hills neighborhood will improve the pedestrian safety as well as help preserve Lake Ellen.

Dear Members and Council,

I am planning to attend the meeting on September 20th at which you will be discussing the "Bicycle and Pedestrian Action Plan" for Chapel Hill. However, I would like to list my concerns in advance. Coming from Germany, where there are extensive bike paths in each city and in rural areas, I have always felt Chapel Hill should do more for bikers. However, the plan to pave the Battle Park Woods trail is not the way to go. In order to encourage people to use their bikes the same way as they do their cars, the bike paths need to follow the streets they would normally drive. I feel all roads in Chapel Hill should follow Carrboro's example by drawing lines along existing road to empahsize space for bikes. These are some of the reasons I am against paving the Battle Branch Trail:

It is one of the last natural hiking trails in Chapel Hill. Anyone who uses it knows about its quiet beauty, how young children can meander and undisturbed explore a myriad of wildlife.

Because of its peace and quiet the trail is home to many birds which live in the beautiful old trees and along the creeks.

Paving the trail would be very costly and require the destruction of many trees, which goes against the city's most recent ordinance against cutting down old trees.

Cyclists already have a way to get from the community center to the UNC campus and that is up and down Franklin Street on the sidewalk.

Cyclists have several other paved roads through forests as well as



designated bicycle lanes in various areas of town.

I favor additional bike paths in town but they should be in terms of marked areas along side of existing roads or in form of sharing existing sidewalks.

I've been riding daily in Chapel Hill since 1986. I've performed federal and state level bicycling research and published numerous papers. I've given the Town much advice over the years. Bicycling here is pretty good once you get used to sweating buckets all summer, freezing in the winter, and climbing gigantic hills.

It is an admirable goal to increase bicycling and to promote positive behaviors. Smoking cessation, exercising, and eating well are all desirable. But it is not right to regulate that people should eat broccoli, however good for you it supposedly is. Inevitably many people don't like it or don't want to be forced to eat it. Similarly, it is not right to regulate bicyclists with bike lanes.

The Town has been trying to increase bicycling since at least the 1970's. The sidewalk bike paths were a European style treatment that were a failure. This effort had the unintended negative consequences of increased collisions and increased harassment of legally riding in-street bicyclists from motorists who were misled to believe that bicyclists should be on the sidewalk. They didn't increase bicycling.

Now the Town wants to again micro-manage and regulate bicyclists' lateral position with bike lane stripes. This is a bad idea for similar reasons, and I strongly object as a bicyclist and a bicycling professional.

Years ago, I briefly was a bike lane supporter, but it quickly became clear that any advantages of bike lanes were not due to the presence of the stripe, but were the result of the increased space.

The provision of bike lanes introduces numerous problems that I've expanded on in several papers and which I will make available to you. All local roads that have bike lanes would be better if the stripe did not exist.

The physical and legal infrastructure already exists for safe and efficient bicycling. Two foot wide bicycles easily fit on any road. It's just that some narrower and busier roads make it more difficult for motorists to pass, which makes some bicyclists less comfortable. Simply increased space alleviates this situation. One can examine a wide lane such as Cameron Ave. to see that it is very easy for even beginners to ride there.

When a bicyclist rides down any road, he or she has 10 to 16 ft of clear pavement in front from which to choose optimal lateral position based on the situation. It's the bicyclists full lane although they often use only a fraction of it. State and local governments do not know better than bicyclists where bicyclists should ride laterally on the road.

When a bike lane is placed, the bicyclist's space is reduced to 4 ft. It creates a bike lane and a motor vehicle lane. This artificially induced segregation is not a benefit to bicyclists.

There is much talk of a bicycle network in the Comprehensive Plan. The vast majority of roads in Chapel Hill and elsewhere, from residential to arterial do not have bike lanes and will not have bike lanes for one reason or another. The pursuit of sporadic bike lanes creates an inherently fragmented system in which bicyclist position is schizophrenic, sometimes to the left of an edge line, sometimes to the right of a bike lane line. If wide lanes were pursued, all roads would be normal and bicyclists would have a consistent in- lane position and a consistent network.

I offer a positive realistic vision in which Chapel Hill treats bicyclists as equal road users, not super or sub equal, just equal. Chapel Hill should apply the wise principle of First, do no Harm," and should abandon the pursuit of bike lanes. Chapel Hill should enhance busier roads where feasible with additional width. Newly developed signs that say COEXIST should replace the misleading "Share the Road' signs. On steep descents and elsewhere, "Use Full Lane' signs should encourage bicyclists to do just that.
