<b>Ann Arbor, MI</b>	4	10 Feet from property line and 40 Feet to any residential structure on an adjacent property	Yes	\$20	Permit requires neighbor consent. One comment was that this is problematic.

<b>Does Not Allow Residential Chickens</b>					
<b>Durham, NC</b>	Only allowed in two zoning districts, RS-20 and RR. The City Council is considering an amendment to the regulations that would allow a permit to be issued for up to 10 chickens per property for personal use.				
<b>Cary, NC</b>	Only allowed in two zoning districts, R-40 and R-80. The Town Council considered and rejected an amendment to the regulations on 7/9/2008.
