Re: Occupancy Numbers for Community House

Phil,

I have prepared some language and provided you a little history that I think will help you with your memorandum to the Town Council.

## **Proposed Community House**

- 1. The proposed Community House facility is a long-term transitional facility that will have 52 beds on the upper level.
- Dormitory beds include two 10-bed (5 bunks in each room) dormitory type rooms for residents initially approved for Community House services.
- 3. Transitional beds include 5 quad rooms (two bunk beds per room) for 20 persons who are stepping up to another level of services.
- 4. Transitional beds also include 6 double rooms (two single beds per room) for twelve residents who are transitioning in the program to a final phase that provides more freedom with responsibilities (residents will have their own keys at this level).
- 5. Since the proposed Community House is defined as a "shelter" in the town ordinance we would naturally make allowances for some floor space on the lower level in case of a community wide disaster, medical emergency, storm, white flag nights (when weather makes it dangerous for people to be on the streets\*), power outage or referral by police/fire agents, local emergency response team, hospital or emergence management officials.

<sup>\*</sup> Temperatures drop below 40 degrees, heavy rains, snow and hail etc.

## Current Men's Residential Shelter at the Old Municipal Building (OMB)

- 1. The IFC currently has 54 spaces that are occupied by male residents every night.
- 2. 54 spaces include 30 beds and 24 floor spaces.
- 3. Before the creation of HomeStart the IFC served men, women and children residents at the OMB.
- 4. After the IFC renovated the OMB in 1989, homeless women and children occupied 18 beds on the basement floor.
- The Community Kitchen moved from Merritt Mill Rd to the main floor at the OMB in 1990.
- 6. Homeless men occupied 34 beds on the second floor.
- 7. The total number of beds did not include floor space which has become a more frequent need in recent years.
- 8. The IFC stopped serving single women and women with children at the OMB in 2003.
- 9. The OMB basement floor is now used for storage only.

## HomeStart Campus for Homeless Women and Children

- 1. Project HomeStart opened in 1998 as a transition housing facility for homeless families.
- 2. The IFC renamed (HomeStart) and redefined HomeStart's mission and resident population in 2003 to include "homeless women and children".
- 3. There are three cottages on a 3 acre parcel at the Southern Human Services Center.
- 4. A total of 56 beds/cots are available in the HomeStart program.
- 5. The Emergency Shelter program in one cottage has a 16-bed capacity.
- 6. Two Transitional Housing cottages have a 20-bed capacity or 40 total beds.
- 7. General floor space for emergency situations is not available.
