Dear Town Council Members,

RE: An placed in the *Chapel Hill Newspaper* that was paid for by the Gimghoul area Homeowners Association.

I am a lifelong Chapel Hill resident. I graduated from the University in 1971 and never moved away. I have worked for UNC Academic Affairs Library for over 25 years. My husband has worked for UNC Hospitals for over 30 years now. We have a 17 year-old daughter, and we live in a house on Hayes Road that is on the edge of Glen Lennox. I tell you this just so you know that I am a permanent resident who loves my home town.

My colleagues at Davis Library, drawn from other parts of the country, have always expressed admiration for the support the people of North Carolina give toward the education of their children. Instead of being caught in the loop of poverty, North Carolina voters have time after time voted to clear a escape path from poverty and illiteracy and allow their children to receive a first-rate education.

Over the years I have stood by too quietly as a town member. I've watched while the powers that be built more lanes onto Columbia Street, made it one-way. This was supposed to help traffic. No, those one-way highways by the hospital complex and the Credit Union are fast-lanes that do nothing good for our town or campus.

I watched the Meadowmont debate. At least the Town Council tried to save the town from a major mistake. Do you really think that Meadowmont is a village where



you can walk anywhere? With million dollar condos at the top of those gigantic hills, there will not be people walking to do their shopping. Not that the landscaping isn't nice from the highway side; and runners, walkers and bikers must like the pathways. But Meadowmont seems to me a beached whale. It just doesn't do our town justice.

I am not saying there are not great people on the Council now. I am saying, however, that the determined Council that existed in the 60's, who put an END to billboards was an incredible and dedicated group of town protectors. How many towns can boast the determination to hold on to an ideal? Go to Raleigh or take a trip and see all the billboards you see everywhere else.

But it takes determination to stay true to the heart of a place because in a University community there are new people coming in every day who may have been drawn to the tradition of excellence and attitudes of tolerance here, but they haven't lived it. I have even heard people say things like: "Well, growth is bound to happen here eventually so we might as well vote for this (subdivision)." I encourage you to remember: NO IT DOESN'T HAVE TO HAPPEN, NOT IF THERE IS COMMITMENT AND PEOPLE TO STAND UP FOR WHAT'S RIGHT FOR OUR COMMUNITY AS A WHOLE.

Sometimes it feels like we are barely a community any more. We've gotten bigger. I hardly see my neighbors on a regular basis. So we have alot working against keeping Chapel Hill a special place.

And people like Chancellor Moeser aren't the enemy as much as they are people who just moved here. You can't expect newcomers to have the pulse of a place. It takes people who *know* what we have to lose. The newcomers may not ever know what those losses are because they have been "moving on." You can't be part of something if you perceive that what you have to give is to change it. So we don't have to blame these people who may be short-sighted, but -- you know what? -- the University is our town too, for good or bad. If we don't keep some of the Village in tact, if we don't nail down some of the Chapel Hill spirit, all we'll have left are the sports teams with any tradition to advertise us.

Maybe that is all we are left with even now. If you read the *Princeton Review 351 Best Colleges* (2004 ed), you'll read that people love their Tar Heels. And that's fine, but don't we want the blurb to also say "Chapel Hill maintains its small-town Southern hospitality and community-mindedness even as it serves a large international, multicultural University, retirement and town community. It is a well-cared for town, a place to grow up *and* grow old."

You are on the Council, I'm not. We need you to take care of us, to take care of our town and the University within it. Don't let Chapel Hill become nothing more than a paved receptacle holding this burgeoning, ever-evolving University in it -- with the character sucked out of it by the many economic and political forces and pressures at work.

A chiller plant on campus? More fastlanes going into town?



<u>I vote no.</u> Town character? Great tradition? Somebody has to step up to the plate and take care of Chapel Hill (the town and the gown).

Thank God that there are still people who are speaking up -- even if self-interest is the only motivation. Chapel Hill wasn't about class at one time. It was the gathering place; your password was getting in the University or working here or being attached to the University or the Hospital. We're a company town.

We in Chapel Hill have so much to lose if we don't help the University keep its marbles. The tax payers of this State have mandated the University here to be great which gives you, our Council a ringing mandate to make this not a 4-year halucination but a real place of living, not just learning. So when a chiller plant and fast-lanes threaten the town, you say no. But you help them find a better place. Why can't town-gown be a team? We're going to grow, we're going to live up to being the best education for the money of any public university anywhere. But you, the Town Council, need to take the high road and help find solutions to these problems, not just throw up your hands and tell the University to go away. Your are the conservators of this place. And this town, this University town, is a very special place.

Subject: Cobb Deck: Take your time

Dear Mayor and Council Members,

Like many of my neighbors I missed several important meetings while taking a long-planned two-week annual vacation during the late summer. Reading the newspapers on my return, I was dismayed to learn of "deals" the University had proposed which trade off one area of town for another. I know that you all care passionately about bike lanes and a town-sized approach into Chapel Hill on Columbia Street rather than super 4 -lanes cutting a swath into campus. I do too, but this kind of horse trading between town and gown, chancellor and mayor is offensive, not the way to go about things and a bad example to our children.

Let's return to the parking decks at hand. The air is very much clearer in Yosemite where I was in early August, and there are wide views which help distill thoughts. What remains troubling to me after all our public meetings and discussions (and I hated to miss any) is that the UNC transportation consultant, George Alexiou's findings do not accurately portray the traffic situation on Country Club Rd. as we Gimghoul neighbors know from our daily experience. This is important because he will be advising UNC and offering evidence to the town as well on a variety of future projects.

I knew this to be true at the first Town Council meeting in June when he presented his findings of "mild inconvenience" to Gimghoul residents entering and leaving Gimghoul and estimating extra seconds instead of minutes as we all know. And in the animated computer diagram of the intersection that he presented at the first town and gown session at the Paul Green Theater, those moving white dots representing cars never seemed to stop moving. No cars turning left into Paul Green Drive ever caused a backup. Cars never stacked up on Gimghoul to wait to turn right or left. No pedestrians pushed walk buttons that caused traffic to stop and back-up. No school buses stopped to unload. All the little cars just kept on humming along, three or four at a time. We all know that this would actually Not be the case, just as we know that the trees in the buffer between the cemetery and parking



deck won't have leaves for a number of months of the year to shield it from view.

At the first town and gown session I asked that we slow down and look at the traffic situation, all of us, (much like a field trip to Greensboro) once 20,000 students return and classes and campus activities begin again in full force. Will you consider honoring my request?

I feel strongly that the traffic situation with all its implications to the town and adjacent neighborhoods needs more scrutiny that George Alexiou has provided. I would like to know on what actual observation, experience and "data collecting" he bases his findings on. Being an artist I am a keen observer and I am willing to help in the gathering and reexamining of the traffic situation in this sensitive corridor. Just as you listened with your ears to the noise of an existing chiller plant, I invite you to visit together and observe with your eyes the traffic in September and imagine increasing the level.

Dear Mr. Horton,

As a member of the university's faculty and a neighbor of the university, I have approached the proposed Cobb Chiller Plant/Parking Deck with two minds. I care deeply about the university's well-being, which depends in no small measure on its dedication to the needs of its employees, students, and visitors. I care deeply, too, for the well-being of the town and its neighborhoods, which depends on a sensitive appreciation of the needs of its residents and visitors. I have followed the ongoing exploration of the university's proposal closely. The more I have heard, the more I have become convinced that the proposed parking deck is unsupportable and should be rejected outright. Let us be clear: The university wishes to increase its parking capacity in the Cobb location, and the increase stands to be substantial once one accounts for the turning over of spaces during various periods of the day. Any benefit to the university that comes from increasing parking capacity in that location is greatly outweighed by the damage it will do to the environs. The area in question already is unruly, unpleasant, and unsafe (I choose mild terms -- the situation is often worse) for motorists and pedestrians alike. Those who would propose to increase the volume of traffic there -- and detract from the historic cemetery while at it -- rightly should bear a heavy burden. fail to see how the university can be said to have come even close to Nor has the university offered serious, feasible sustaining it. proposals that would truly mitigate the harm it would have us endure.

The town's needs and interests are substantial here. They should not be sacrificed so lightly.

Subject: No 'deal', No deck, Better solutions

My understanding of Monday's Town/UNC discussions is that: although the UNC representatives did indeed present their possible getting out of the way of the South Columbia Street improvements as part of a 'deal', the Town's representatives made it clear that that 'deal' was unacceptable and that the South Columbia Street issue must be separated from the University's request to make modifications in their approved development plan. I took the 'de-linking' references to refer to that separation. The media and some of my neighbors did not understand it the way I did.

If UNC does support the speedy implementation of the South Columbia Street improvements, they will be honoring an agreement they made five years ago. How on earth can they expect any reward for being true to their word other than some tentative return of respect and perhaps trust?

So, what has progress has UNC actually made since Monday's meeting toward getting those South Columbia Street improvements started? That will be a measure of their sincerity.

UNC says---almost as a threat---that if they unblock and help push through the South Columbia Street plan, then they will have to start factoring in the proposed new south road.



The new southern road is a huge component of the Master Plan. Why on earth don't they ALREADY have it under study?

UNC says that the need for the Jackson Circle parking increase is urgent---so urgent that they must scrap that particular part of their once loved Master plan, including some aesthetically and efficiently designed buildings with the parking underneath, in order to cram in yet another parking deck. This would be a permanent structure (I assume) to provide temporary (18 months, more or less) spaces for the 600 vehicles which will be displaced when the Bell Tower lot is closed while they convert it from 600 surface to 1000 decked parking spaces. But the nearby Ram's Head parking space will be open by then. How many spaces will be there?

Surely there are ways to get more people to central campus without starting to erode UNC's own Master and Development plans! About 90% of the vehicles coming and going in the Mason Farm/Oteys/Westwood/South Columbia/Purefoy neighborhoods are single occupancy vehicles. One car, one driver.

Caroline Elfland's excellent and increasingly effective incentive transit program has provided one example of how to help us move into the future. It will probably lead to even more people learning how to live in the 21st century, with fewer cars, and people learning alternative ways to get where they want to be.

Moeser is quoted in this morning's CHNews as saying that the Cobb/Gimghoul area becomes a student cruising area in the late afternoon.

Why is that possible? Surely there are ways of dealing with that without adding yet more traffic. Shouldn't those people be using the Manning Drive surface parking?

I'm off to Hillsborough for jury duty. Thank you for listening.

To Mayor Foy and Town Council members Strom and Wiggins (and earlier, Verkerk) and others:

I was struck by the strength and depth of your articulate participation in the Town/UNC discussion on Friday. Thank you again and continuingly for your energetic contributions to this process.

I'm trying to put something together for tomorrow and/or the Council meeting, but my thoughts keep running all over each other. Here are some of my bits and pieces.

The importance of making the South Columbia Street improvements for their own sake must be emphasized, and not as part of a deal, but because following through on that plan is the Right Thing to do. (Easy for me to say?) When UNC gets back on board on that project, there might be some restoration of belief in the University's good faith. Their gain can be in trust and respect, but not in the Town's approval of a band-aid parking deck for even more single occupancy vehicles to fill a short-term gap! Please. Sometimes I think that they need to be saved from themselves.

Just because UNC handlers might belatedly come to their senses about the South Columbia Street improvements doesn't mean that the Town needs to approve UNC's ill-advised request to attract even more vehicles through the perimeter neighborhoods to new cement slabs in the center of campus.

What happened to the admirable goal of moving PEOPLE where they want to go? Vehicles



using the parking currently available in and around the hospital complex rarely have passengers in them. It's the driver alone in his machine. Isn't THAT where to cut down the alleged need for more parking? Share cars? Vanpools? Don't HOV's get any incentive? How about more?

The proposed Jackson Circle deck is unjustified. There must be better ways to deal with the short-term disruption caused by the conversion of the Bell Tower Deck from surface to deck parking. How long will that conversion actually take? A year? 18 months? 24?

For that short-term purpose, UNC wants to overrule its own Master Plan, deleting the sensible and aesthetic under-the-building parking so they can slam up yet another layered block of car storage places? Boy, is that regressive! What would Adam Gross say?

Will they be tearing that (Jackson Circle) deck down two years later when the Bell Tower deck opens? Is this cost-efficient? Surely they can do better than that.

Possible approaches (a combination of?):

make current surface Jackson circle parking HOV only = additional people, not cars? negotiate to temporarily borrow some of the 2500 (4000?) student spaces? Students, too, can carpool?

allocate some of the unused spaces in the two monster hospital decks to HOV employees? Reduce the Manning Drive surface parking area fees for HOVs?

Can Carolyn Elfland expand her excellent success of over 500 fewer parking permit requests? That trend is really in the spirit of the future. Who has the statistics on how she pulled that off so that it can be continued?

## Questions:

How many PEOPLE (not cars) currently arrive by car at each of the current surface parking areas at Cobb, Jackson Circle, Bell Tower?

Couldn't they get those same (or more) people there, by restricting them to multiple occupancy vehicles?

Why doesn't UNC take advantage of TTA's vanpool planning? (CHHerald, today/Sunday, 17 Aug, 2003, including how they make sure that individuals can deal with emergencies, if they arise)

Can't SOVs use the unsold spaces at the current Manning surface lot, saving the central campus parking for HOVs and multi-people carriers, thereby transporting more people to their destinations without adding more vehicles?

How long will undergraduates be allotted such a high proportion/number of the available car spaces? This is such a shocker!

You see why I need to tidy this up.

COBB DECK IS A BAD IDEA

We are opposed to the University's plan to construct a parking deck in the area behind the Paul Green Theater adjacent to Cobb Dormitory and the Chapel Hill Cemetery

In June, the University brought to the Town Council significant changes to the Development Plan that the Council approved in 2001. The University labeled the changes as "minor" revisions to the Plan. We disagree. These changes appear to totally reverse the intent of the Plan and the Town Council will make a decision on this proposal on August 25th.

The traffic situation already is hazardous and Cobb Deck will magnify the problem dramatically. The intersection at Gimghoul Road/Country Club Road/Paul Green Drive already is congested and dangerous, particularly at rush hours. Motorists on Country Club frequently speed. Negotiating turns at the intersection is perilous. Traffic volume will increase significantly because of new decks already constructed or in process of construction, making a bad situation worse.

UNC proposes adding more than 130 new parking spaces, doubling the parking available behind Cobb Dorm and the theater. This very large increase in number actually understates the adverse impact on traffic volume. What is more, UNC plans to close access from Raleigh Street and route all or most of the vehicles on Paul Green Drive. The result will be a significant increase in traffic at all hours and very high volume at peak hours. We do not believe that this problem can be mitigated satisfactorily.

Effect on neighborhood safety, environment, and use of the Gimghoul Historic District belongs to and is enjoyed by the entire town, offering a park-like setting. The neighborhood is used by many residents and students for jogging, walking, strolling with children, bicycling, and dog walking, as well as fundraising walks and races. Countless tourists (including many alumni) visit the neighborhood to sightsee, tour gardens, and view the castle.

Entering the neighborhood for these purposes already is treacherous due to excessive traffic. Increased traffic from the Cobb Deck would magnify the problem and make visiting Gimghoul a difficult and trying experience. Accidents should be expected.

Effects on the cemetery are negative

A large parking deck and chiller plant directly abutting an historic cemetery is simply inappropriate. The Historic District Commission on June 12, in a 6 to 0 vote, found that proposed changes to the UNC Development Plan Modification are not minor. They are major.

The Commission found the project incongruous with the historic nature of the campus, the neighborhood, especially because of its proximity to the Old Chapel Hill Cemetery, a national register listed historic property.

The members felt strongly that the proposed structures should not be built on this site, and that the structures would not be congruous with the height, setbacks, and placements, form and proportions and architectural scale of thehistoric district. In addition, the use of this area is both inappropriate and in conflict with the University's efforts to discourage traffic in the center of campus and with community reverence for the cemetery.

We strongly urge reconsideration of the development plans

Adding to the activity is the Paul Green Theater and Dramatic Arts building beside the cemetery. During the school year, plays are performed six times a week and attended by the public and the students.

The proposed deck is planned to sit behind the Paul Green Dramatic Arts building and adjacent dormitories and beside the cemetery. This huge parking deck, taller than the buildings around it, will also include a giant cooling system on top, creating noise as well as bulk, looming over a cemetery which is on the National Register of Historic Places. When there is a funeral or graveside service, will the voices paying tribute to the dead have to compete with the noise from the cooling system?

For over thirty years, the Preservation Society, town boards, and the Historical Society have worked to document and preserve old houses, buildings, rock walls and neighborhoods and have created local and national historic districts. The restoration and documentation of the old cemetery was included in this work. Many of our most distinguished citizens and University graduates are buried here. We did this work not only for us but for future generations to enjoy, reminding us all who we are, where we have been, and giving Chapel Hill a distinctive sense of place and identity.



Dear Chancellor Moeser:

I am returning this solicitation from m commitment. My heart hurts. I was brought up to believe that this University was the salvation of the State and no sacrifice was enough to ensure that the needs of the State and the mission of the University were meant. My parents, both graduates of the University, gave up a lucrative life in Cleveland to come back to Chapel Hill and live on pennies to build a dream, a four year medical school complete with hospital and service to those who needed care in this State. I am a graduate of Chapel Hill (Class of 1957) and spent over twenty years of my life working in rather menial jobs, many of which resulted in ten to twelve hour days six or seven days a week. I was honored several years ago with a Massey Award, which, I am certain, was the result of my efforts to create a formal December Graduation and the creation of the Greek Temple stage for the May Commencement. I was, and am, extremely grateful to the Massey family and the University for this honor and for the fact that my Mother, Norma Berryhill, was able to attend the presentation.

I applaud with enthusiasm your strong support of the arts on this campus. The Ackland Museum is a most important part of this campus, and indeed the State and I have recently served as Vice President of that Guild. And, of course Hill Hall and Memorial Hall are treasured places in which such beauty has been shared. In Memorial Hall I have seen and heard such a wide range of historical folks, from Eleanor Roosevelt to Louis Armstrong and soon the venue will be marvelous once more.

However, I write today because I am unable at this point to contribute any of my meager retirement and Social Security pay or my Mother's finances, to

the University (we consider it our University) that is about to ruin the property value of the homes in the Gimghoul neighborhood. This plan is the most ill-conceived and obvious cover-up for a mistake in planning that was made several years ago. The traffic will be unmanageable and, even though I love living here, some days I do have to leave my street to do necessary errands. It now takes an average of two to five minutes to turn left onto Country Club Road, that is not during the rush hour times in the morning and afternoon. At those times, it can take as much as seven or eight minutes unless some kind person lets me in the left turn lane. I shutter to think of Fire Trucks and EMS vehicles trying to negotiate getting onto Gimghoul during those times.

Of course, the deck will be used in the evening for PlayMakers, on football weekends, for Women's Basketball and all other non-revenue sports played in Carmichael and on the adjacent fields. And, of course, that results in more foot traffic across the Old Chapel Hill Cemetery. Foot traffic that is not respectful to the hallowed place it crosses.

I am sorry that I feel this way; however, I am not alone.

The demise of the Gimghoul Neighborhood and the devaluation of everyone's investments will be noted for a long time. What will be created beside the Old Chapel Hill Cemetery, where my Father and my son are buried, to which I now have no access to tend the graves, and where my Mother, my sister and I will be in the hereafter, is a travesty on the history of Chapel Hill, the University and the State.

As I say, my heart hurts.





I am writing to express my objections to the chiller plant between Country Club Road and Raleigh Road. If implemented, such a plan would disturb the nearby historic cemetery, disrupt the beauty of the historic UNC campus with noise and smoke plumes, and add to congestion and gridlock at peak traffic times, blocking the only public access route to the historic Ginghoul neighborhood.

First, the proposed parking deck and chiller facility would be adjacent to the University's historic cemetery, founded in 1793, twenty-six years before the incorporation of Chapel Hill in 1819. Containing the graves of both the University's and the town's early leaders as well as some of the oldest families in Chapel Hill, the UNC cemetery is a place of spiritual contemplation, where burials are still conducted. The peace and quiet of the cemetery would be disrupted by car alarms as well as the noise and smoke of the proposed chiller plant. A brief visit to the chiller facility at the University Medical Center demonstrates the very loud whirring noise of industrial turbine fans and the thirty to forty foot plumes of white smoke that can be seen rising above the units on humid days. Such a facility would bring the unsettling sights and piercing sounds of an industrial zone next to the University's hallowed burial ground and historic district.

The proposed parking deck and chiller facility would also disrupt the beauty and architectural cohesion of the UNC campus, chartered in 1789. The University is widely and justifiably regarded at one of the nation's most scenic public universities. While the school's physical beauty is one of its enduring strengths, it is a quality that can be easily lost. For example, the proposed construction plan calls for the destruction and replacement of the existing historic stone walls with heightened and reinforced walls to surround the cemetery. High, fortress-like walls would run counter to the low, natural stone walls that are a quintessential part of UNC's charm. Nor are high walls historically compatible with the architectural period when the stone walls were originally built during the early 1800s. High walls symbolize separation and division, rather than the inclusion and openness that are part of the University's mission. The graveyard should not need to be separated and protected from an industrial zone.

Last, the proposed parking deck is meant to alleviate driver inconvenience and traffic congestion, but it would likely result in exactly the opposite. Already, the left turn lane from Country Club Road onto South Road is congested and backed up from 4:30pm to 5:30pm. A parking deck with its entrance on Country Club would only exacerbate this

situation. Cars would have a difficult time even exiting from the parking deck and reaching Country Club Road. Indeed, the higher volume of cars going to and from the proposed parking deck would necessarily increase traffic and slow the existing, highly efficient University bus system. If a parking deck and gridlock are to exist, a more logical entrance and exit would be on Raleigh Road.

A more rational and longer-term solution to the University's parking dilemma would see more remote parking lots and increased frequency of the Park and Ride bus service. If one looks at the existing parking lot on the north side of South Road near the Friends Meeting House and preschool, one would see the existing problems with UNC parking lots affecting both the Friends Meeting House and the Gimghoul neighborhood: bright headlights, frequent car alarms, beer bottles, and unsightly trash. In the past years, the University has done nothing to alleviate this problem affecting the Gimghoul Historic District, nor has it created a sound barrier to block the traffic noise and car alarms from this existing parking lot. This inaction demonstrates the likely response to future problems with the proposed parking deck.

The University has a beautiful campus, but people are already saying that the bulldozer has replaced the ram as the school's mascot. Let's not allow rampant construction to destroy the quiet peace of the UNC cemetery or the neighborhood calm on the Gimghoul Historic District, the Battle Park area, and the Coker Arboretum to achieve short-sighted goals. It is my hope that the Chapel Hill Town Council will vote unanimously during its next session on August 25th to stop the University from constructing a parking deck and chiller plant next to the historic UNC cemetery or the Chapel Hill historic neighborhoods. It is my hope that the University will instead use its resources to enhance its Park and Ride system and that it will maintain its beauty by addressing the problems associated with existing parking facilities near historic neighborhoods.



I write to encourage the providing of additional parking spaces near UNC-CH buildings. I am neither a UNC nor Duke graduate. I live near Eastgate Plaza off Route 15/501, an ideal location for attending events at both UNC and Duke University. I attend events at Duke in Durham more frequently than at UNC because I can park more easily at Duke within walking distance of buildings.

I certainly recognize that a private university has more financial resources than a public university, but both private Duke and public UNC are outstanding education institutions that offer their surrounding communities outstanding and varied opportunities. One of my strongest reasons for moving to Chapel Hill was the presence of UNC and the proximity of Duke. I would like a safe and easy way to attend UNC cultural events in my own car.

While public mass transit is a good idea for commuters, it usually must be subsidized. And some commuters want to know a car is available for family emergencies and perhaps for daily responsibilities on the way to and from work. Also, walking from a bus stop with packages or at night can be unsafe and/or unfeasible.

More important, I and some others agree with the UNC employees' representative who pointed out that UNC employees work around the clock and need safe parking locations close to where they work. Students also need safety as they go to and from the library and campus events after dark. Employees who live outside of Chapel Hill must drive to work, and employees in general usually expect parking space as part of their employment.

Many folks, myself included, consider the older UNC campus unplanned for traversing in bad weather or darkness. I have attended several UNC Humanities weekends where many have commented about the attractiveness and convenience of



the newer area around the Business School, where adequate parking is available. While it is not possible to add spacious grounds within the original campus, it is possible to add safety and convenience. Plus, more adequate parking for the public may increase door receipts and public donations.

If I could solve traffic congestion, I would opt for more fuel-efficient vehicles and alternative fuel sources starting years ago. What we can do within Chapel Hill is update for a more flexible traffic control system as suggested by our Traffic Engineer and support roads with center medians to accommodate both vehicles and pedestrians.

Bicycle lanes are a pleasant feature, but they do not serve a large portion of our population, and many bicyclers are only weekend, fair-weather enthusiasts. Even students who bicycle on campus require cars for off-campus needs and leisure activities.

Please let us not waste time and energy agonizing over whether a building's styling includes traditional pediments or whether a cemetery will survive with more extensive landscape screening than it currently has.

Our world, national, and local population will continue to grow. Our plats and plots will have to change from time to time. More parking will not bring more cars to UNC as much as more parking will make UNC events more safely accessible with lower gasoline emissions from cars circling looking for parking.
