Project Description:

As part of the Chapel Hill Public Arts Commission's Arts in Education Program, professional sculptor Bryant Holsenbeck partnered with Visual Art Instructor Angela Greene's advanced eighth grade sculpture students at the Guy B. Phillips Middle School in Chapel Hill. The students worked with Ms Holsenbeck from mid-September 2003 through early-December 2003, participating in every aspect of the project's development, from siting analyses to design composition to fabrication.

The work is comprised of 70 cement casts of each student's hands. Collectively, the cast hands are organized to spell out the word T-H-I-N-K. The word THINK was selected because of the students' concern that people are less reflective than they should be and too frequently act without thought. While the cement was still drying, 28-inch long rebar was inserted in the base of each cast to permit it to be firmly placed in the earth. The hands are painted red to symbolize the importance of stopping to think as well as to get the attention of those walking and driving along Airport Road in front of the Police Station. On the back of each cast is a hand-written statement by the student that describes who they are and what they are concerned about. The front palm of each cast reveals the individual's fingerprints and other personal marks of identification. A few examples of some of the students' personal expressions include:

- Life, What is its purpose? Where does it go? What is it? I ask what you know. How much time do we have in this mysterious place? You don't know. It's your goals you must chase.
- When you set a path 4 yourself, go ahead and follow it; only after a storm, is there debris blocking your
- My tears fall, into my hand, but not a noise do I make, I'll drop my tears into the lake. The darkness hides my shiny face, and the lines my tears have drawn.
- Discover the magic of myself.
- If you live life to the fullest, life will be worth it all.

The project was funded in part by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) Arts Learning award with additional support from the Town of Chapel Hill.

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Chapel Hill Public Arts Commission

Established in 1992, the mission of the Chapel Hill Public Arts Commission (CHPAC) is to enhance and enliven the community through art in public places. CHPAC fulfills its mission by planning and implementing public art projects and programming, managing the Town's Percent for Art program, and initiating partnerships in the arts. Eighteen volunteer Commission members are appointed by the Town Council to serve as advisors and supporters of public art, increase public access to the arts, and promote understanding and awareness of public art. • Public art adds immeasurably to our vitality and spirit; enlivens our intellectual and aesthetic environment: increases educational opportunities; strengthens our collective identity; and creates a dynamic arts community.

Chapel Hill's Percent for Art Ordinance

In March 2002, the Chapel Hill Town Council approved a Percent for Art Ordinance, which calls for one percent or another amount to be appropriated for public art from requested Capital Improvement Projects. Each year, the Commission reviews and evaluates which projects are the most appropriate for the inclusion of public art. In summer 2002, sculptor Mike Roig created Promethean Honor Guard for the new Fire Station 5 on Bennett Road. His work has become the centerpiece of this new public building. In fall 2002, artist Arlene Slavin designed four benches for Streetscape along Franklin Street.

Currently, two new Percent for Art projects are in design: painter David Wilson is collaborating with the Hargraves Community Center to design large scale murals for the Center's addition, and ceramicist Sally Erickson will be creating a series of interior works for the IFC Shelter.

In 2004, the Town will commission artists to design future Percent for Art projects at the Town Operations Center, the new home for the Public Works Department and Chapel Hill Transit; the Post Office on Franklin Street; a selected tennis or basketball court as part of the ongoing renovations at Parks and Recreation facilities; the new Aquatics Center at Homestead Park; and, Southern Community Park.
