

SUMMARY OF HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION ACTION

Subject:

2004-19 Preliminary Capital Improvements Program

Meeting Date:

April 8, 2004

Recommendations: The Commission makes the following comments regarding the Preliminary Capital Improvements Program:

Infrastructure:

- Installation of trash receptacles in the historic districts along the major pedestrian arteries. A hierarchy of pedestrian arteries is suggested below with installation phased over a 4-year period. The suggested pedestrian arteries include:
 - Hillsborough Road
 - Pittsboro Road
 - Cameron Avenue
 - North Street
 - E. Franklin Street (blocks without existing trash receptacles)

The Commission requested making recommendations for appropriate containers.

- > Install of Historic District identification sign poles congruous with the Historic District. Recommendations for sign poles have been provided.
- > Continuing maintenance of Chapel Hill gravel and upgrading of sidewalks in the Historic Districts:
- > Continuing neighborhood needs for curb and gutter;
- > Improve pedestrian level lighting which would be compatible with the character of the historic districts:
- > Investigate underground utilities;
- > Installation of historic district street signs. Recommend using sign poles congruous with the Historic District;
- > Installation of historic district identification signs on materials more congruous with the Historic District;
- > Maintain funding for mediation for property owners seeking demolition in historic districts;



> Continued work on the Chapel Hill Cemetery. The Commission appreciates the university's assistance with the restoration of the cemetery walls and for their financial support for future work.

Town Facilities:

> Continued support of the on-going maintenance of the Chapel Hill Museum and for future Post Office repairs.

Communications & Technology:

> Develop website for Historic District Commission that will include current applications.
