

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON
PROPOSED TRANSIT PROJECTS AND SERVICE CHANGES – TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL

Transportation Department – Program of Projects for 2001-02

Notice is hereby given that the Town of Chapel Hill is developing a program of projects for submission to the Federal Transit and the North Carolina Department of Transportation for federal and state grant funding for fiscal year 2001-2002. The Chapel Hill Transportation Advisory Board will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, June 26, 2001 at 5:00 p.m. on the Transportation Department’s FY2001-02 Program of Projects.

The public hearing will be held at the Chapel Hill Transit facility located on Municipal Drive in Chapel Hill in the administrative office’s conference room.

The proposed uses of transit grant funds are:

1. Preventive Maintenance/Capital Assistance

The estimated amount of capital assistance to be requested for 2001-02 is \$750,000.

2. Capital Projects

Section 5307 capital funds would be used to purchase replacement vehicles such as lift-equipped vans and support sedans. These funds would also be used to purchase major spare parts such as engine and transmission rebuilds, air conditioning compressors, and bus tires.

3. Planning Projects

Planning grant funds would be used for short-range transit planning projects such as service and fare analysis and monitoring of public transportation activities. The amounts to be requested for planning projects are \$47,529 (Section 5303) and \$99,027 (Section 5307).

4. Service Changes

The Town of Chapel Hill will annex the Southern Village and Notting Hill communities on July 1, 2001 and will provide town services including Chapel Hill Transit bus service to these communities.

At the public hearing citizens may make oral or written comments and recommendations on the transit projects. If no comments are received, the proposed Program of Projects may become the final Program of Projects.

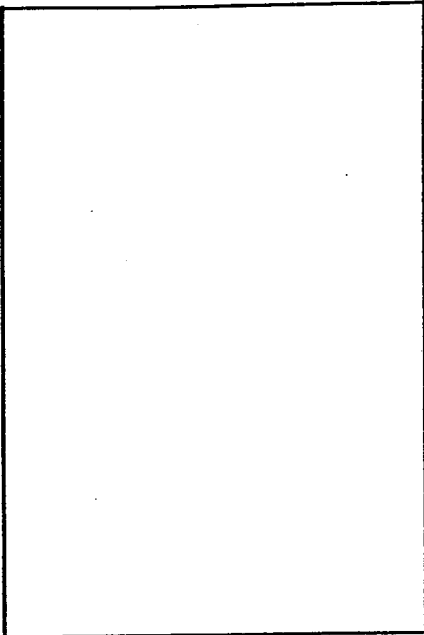

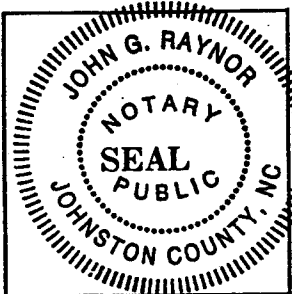

The board must decide this month the maximum amount it will put before the voters on the November ballot and specify the general uses for the money.

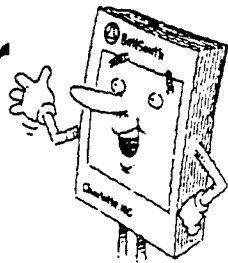
The commissioners do not have to announce specific projects that would be funded under the bond, but they usually announce their plans as part of educating the public about the need for a bond.
