Dear Ms. Kuschatka: I am one of the original organizers for the

petition

against the residential portion of the buses on the V Route. The contents

of this letter are solely my views and should not be interpreted to the views of anyone else.

I am listed on the cover letter to you and the City Council. I've worked on

the petition with John Wagner and Melanie Joy who you met with a few weeks

ago, as well as an abundant number of other residents that supported the petition drive. During a recent City Council open forum meeting, I submitted on Monday 10/22 the attached petition to the Clerk and City Council.

I left you a phone message earlier today. I'm contacting you to find out

when the City Council will have a hearing on our petition and/or your proposal. Myself and several other residents want to attend the hearing and

have an opportunity to provide our views and concerns.

I also understand that you recently surveyed Southern Village and are considering recommending to the City Council a reconfigured bus route to serve the ridership in the residential area, which is apparently concentrated in townhomes near the private pool area at the corner of Highgrove and Brookgreen. Well, I measured the distance from the pool

Brookgreen&Market (in the commercial area) and it is exactly 0.3 miles. It

is also my understanding that the City tries to provide bus service to within 1/4 mile of all residents in Chapel Hill, which would cover the SV

private pool facility.

However, as anyone can see, there are many (if not nearly all) residential

neighborhoods in Chapel Hill that do not have any bus service--perhaps because they do not want or need bus service and the attendant parking problems that follow. Moreover, as evidenced by our petition, there are over 300 households representing over 900 residents (many on the current and, presumably, your to-be-proposed route) that are opposed to buses going

down their street.

I just cannot see why Southern Village is being singled out to have bus service with low ridership (in particular, low ridership attributable to

residential area) forced upon an overwhelming majority of the residents

clearly do not want or need bus service down the residential streets.

However, please do not get me wrong: I (and, from what I can tell, probably

all of the residents supporting the petition) fully support bus service to

the Park&Ride and commercial area of Southern Village. We all feel that such service is beneficial and reasonable. However, in my view, it is unfair and unreasonable to prejudice and defy 87% of the Southern Village

homeowners to accommodate the unreasonable demands of a few residents (ie,

an incredibly small minority of the residents) who cannot "commute" 0.3+ miles (or, 3+ blocks) to the commercial area. This is particularly unreasonable given that many 5-10 year old children walk to the Scroggs Elementary School every day, which is a longer "commute" than the few residents that insist on curb-side bus service 25 times per day.

Of course, there are a whole host of other reasons why it is unfair and nonsensical to run 25 nearly empty buses per day thru narrow residential streets used abundantly by adults, children and pets, but I will leave

for the hearing unless you would like me to elaborate further.

I look forward to hearing from you or your superior(s) in regards notice

a public hearing on our petition and/or your bus transit recommendations affecting Southern Village.

Hi,

I am a resident of Southern Village. I am a student at the UNC School of

Dentistry, and I ride the V bus. I have been hearing of opposition to

V route from certain people in the neighborhood, and I am very unhappy about it. I live in a part of Southern Village that is a fair walk from the commercial area and Park and Ride lot, so the V bus has made commuting

a lot easier. I read the recent article in the Chapel Hill News about these people who are trying to get rid of the V bus. I think that the whole idea of Southern Village was a commuter friendly sort of neighborhood, but without the V bus, I would have to walk a half mile or more, sometimes in harsh weather, to catch the bus. I read that they called the bus unused, but if they had ridden on it in the morning, they would have seen that most mornings, the bus is half full, which is more than I have seen on many of the other Chapel Hill routes. Also, this "petition" of theirs sounds suspicious to me. First off, noone ever came

to my door, or many of the doors of the other folks that live around me. I believe it could have been that we live in townhomes and condos, and they assumes that we were probably students who rode the bus and wouldn't agree with their efforts. Also, if you know how petitions usually go, someone shows up on your doorstep harassing you about an issue

that doesn't really bother you, and often people just sign it to avoid a conflict. I hardly believe that the numbers listed in the article reflect

the number of people who really oppose the bus. I know you want to make people happy, but please understand that while you are pleasing a few vocal people in the neighborhood, you will be alienating many who are unaware of their efforts. I urge you to consider getting the opinions of

people in an unbiased manner, and if the route must be restricted, please

have it include at least the apartments, townhomes, and condominiums. These probably contain more V riders than the housed

anyway. Thank you for your consideration, and please help the riders of the V bus! And if there is anything else I can do to oppose the efforts of these people, please let me know.

Dear Ms. Knapp:

I was disappointed that your article on Southern Village residents' response

to the new V bus route did not include any residents' comments in support of

the bus route. I have heard that there was at least one petition supporting

the bus route, and that the board of the neighborhood homeowners' association had decided not to take a stand because the board itself was divided, and believed the neighborhood to be divided on this issue.

We bought a house in Southern Village about a year and a half ago because we

liked the idea of living in a "new urbanism" neighborhood. We support the

bus route going through the neighborhood and find Mr. Rogers' and Mr. Wagner's statements to be untrue and misleading.

Chris Rogers was quoted as saying, "No one had any notice of 25 empty buses

a day careening down our busy streets." But information about the V route

was included in the packet distributed to each household in Southern Village

a few days before the neighborhood was annexed on July 1. I also read at

least one article in the Chapel Hill News last spring discussing the then-pending annexation that mentioned the new bus route. I have problems

with the "25 empty buses a day" part of Mr. Rogers' statement as well. With

a new bus route, I would have been surprised to hear that the bus instantly

had many riders. I would expect that the number of riders to increase over

time as residents find ways to utilize the bus more often. When I spoke with Mary Lou Kuschatka last week about this issue, she confirmed that the

number of riders was steadily increasing.

Mr. Rogers and Mr. Wagner want the new bus to be restricted to the commercial section of Southern Village and describe this as a "minor" reconfiguration. What this means for many residents, however, notably for

those who like us live in the Highgrove section of Southern Village, is a

10-minute walk that includes a steep, 2-block section of Brookgreen Drive.

We do use the bus from the Park-and-Ride lot, but that is a fifteen-minute

walk away for us. Insisting that residents hike up a steep hill or drive

their cars to the bus stop doesn't support public transportation and the spirit of a "new urbanism" neighborhood.



I am most puzzled by Mr. Wagner's statement that the bus is "...demonstrably dangerous to pedestrians." Why is a bus any more dangerous than all of the other vehicles including construction trucks, delivery trucks, moving vans, and cars that travel on our neighborhood streets every day? The whole point of the bus is to decrease the traffic by encouraging less dependence on automobile use.

In other places I have lived easy access to bus service was seen to increase property values; it is certainly desirable for anyone working or studying at UNC.

Subject: Support for Southern Village Bus Service

Dear Ms. Kuschatka:

I am a resident of Southern Village, and I am writing to express my support for the bus service that was recently extended to our community. I understand that quite a few of my neighbors have contacted you recently to oppose this service, and some of them may have implied or suggested that the service is only appreciated by those who live in the apartments or condominiums near the "business" section of Southern Village. I therefore want to make clear that I live in the heart of the single-family housing in the "residential" portion of the neighborhood--an area that will not be served by the V bus if my neighbors succeed in persuading you to confine the service to the business district.

I support the bus service in Southern Village not only because I personally use it, but also because I am a 21-year resident of Chapel Hill who very much understands and appreciates how important Chapel Hill Transit is to the quality of life in our Town. Like many Chapel Hillians, I am concerned about the effect of excessive automobile traffic in our community. The gridlock and environmental degradation that results when everyone travels in private automobiles erodes quality of life. Bus service that is readily available to all the Town's citizens is one important way we can avoid excessive traffic and its negative effects.

I also share with many Chapel Hillians a concern about how we manage growth. The principal reason my family chose to move to Southern Village is its "new urban" style of development. The high density of this kind of development has the potential to work out well or poorly for Chapel Hill. On the one hand, Southern Village is very pedestrian- and bicycle-friendly, and completion of the pathways between here and the southern edge of the UNC campus will make it even more so. On the other hand, without some means besides private automobiles to reach areas of town that are more distant, I fear that Southern Village -- with its high concentration of people and cars so close to 15-501 and Highway 54-- will eventually cause major traffic and environmental problems. I think the maintenance of bus service in the neighborhood is critical to making sure that this doesn't happen.

Because of the potential impact on the Town as a whole, I hope that the issue of bus service in Southern Village will not be viewed as a matter affecting only the residents of this neighborhood. If Chapel Hill is to host high-density development—and it seems inevitable that we will have to do even more of this in the future—then I think we need to take a position as a Town that we will use various means,

including readily available public transportation, to avoid potential negative impacts of that development on all the Town's citizens. I therefore hope that the "squeaky wheels" in Southern Village will not succeed in overriding the concerns of the Town as a whole with their effort to discontinue bus service in the neighborhood.

Thank you for your attention to my concerns.
