#### INFORMATION SHEET

The Orange County Community Resource Court (CRC) was created to address the treatment needs of people with mental health issues who became involved with the criminal courts. The CRC is a special type of court that links eligible offenders with services and supports that help them to better manage their mental illness. Some people call this type of court a "mental health court" because it helps people with mental illness stay out of trouble with the law by helping them get the mental health treatment they need.

The type of treatment offered varies depending on each person's needs and will be provided by the Orange-Person-Chatham (OPC) Mental Health Area Program or one of its affiliates. Some of the services available at OPC are: individual and group mental health and substance abuse therapies, psychiatric services and medication management, and case management.

Participation in the Community Resource Court is voluntary. To be considered for admission the CRC, the offender must agree to be screened by OPC staff and obtain or provide the court with a mental health assessment. The offender will also be asked to sign a consent form that allows OPC to share information about treatment with attorneys and the court.

People who are found eligible to participate in the CRC, agree to accept mental health or substance abuse treatment instead of receiving a fine or jail sentence for their crime. The court will dispose of these special cases either through a:

- Deferred Prosecution defendant could earn a dismissal of charges if compliant with treatment recommendations or
- Supervised Probation defendant will be supervised by probation officer but will not serve any active time if compliant with treatment recommendations.

The length of time an offender participates in treatment will be set by the court and may last up to six months or longer. If the offender fails to comply with their treatment recommendations, the case can be returned to regular District Court for further disposition.

# **Eligibility Criteria**

- Must be charged with a criminal offense.
- Must have a mental health diagnosis or mental health treatment history.\*

[\*Priority will be given to defendants with SPMI (severe and persistent mental illness) diagnosis, who would be eligible for long term case management services by OPC/CRC Case Manager.]

- Must be agreeable to treatment.
- The District Attorney must screen case to see if charges are appropriate for Community Resource Court.

# **COMMUNITY RESOURCE COURT**

#### **DEFENDANT INFORMATION SHEET**



The Orange County Community Resource Court (CRC) was created to address the treatment needs of people with diagnosed mental disorders who become involved with the criminal courts.

\*\*Participation in the Community Resource Court is voluntary\*\*

#### To be eligible to participate in CRC:

- the District Attorney must screen case to see if charges are appropriate
- must have mental health diagnosis, developmental disability or a mental health treatment history
- may also have a substance abuse problem
- must agree to engage in recommended mental heath treatment

#### If you are interested in being referred to CRC:

- you will meet with OPC Mental Health case manager who will ask you some confidential questions about your mental health history
- you will be asked to sign an Informed Consent Form which gives the case manager your permission to talk with other court persons and your attorney about your mental health or medical information
- if you do not have an attorney, the court will ask you questions to see if you qualify for a court-appointed attorney
- you will be asked to get a mental health assessment or provide a copy of a recent mental health assessment

# If you are found eligible for CRC—you can expect the following:

- you must agree to comply with your recommended treatment plan, including taking prescribed medications, for a period of time set by the Court (usual treatment period is a minimum of 6 months)
- OPC Case Manager or treatment provider will keep the Court informed of your compliance with your recommended treatment and medication compliance
- you will be required to come to court on a regular basis about your treatment progress and medication compliance

\*\*Your participation in the Community Resource Court is a voluntary alternative to a regular Court disposition.

<u>Failure to comply</u> with the Community Resource Court treatment alternative could result in your case being returned to regular court for trial or sentencing.\*\*
