On Motion of Mr. Pickard, the franchise
of the Chapel Hill Telephone Co.,
submitted Dec. 1st - 10, was adopted
Miss Hersey & Patterson not voting.

On Motion of Mr. McCauley, it was
ordered that one third of the Town's
Money be kept in the People's Bank.
The Board then adjourned.

Memo. as to Sewers.

The University to turn over to the Town of Chapel Hill the entire sewer system outside the campus for Five Thousand Dollars, plus free outlet for University sewerage on North side of campus.

The University also to turn over those connectors now residing near the campus, but not a part of the University plant, for example, fraternity houses, and Archer, Berry and Roberson residences, being a total of nine connections, the University reserving, however, control of all sewer lines on the University campus.

There are twenty-four connectors now on Franklin and Rosemary Street lines outside the campus.

The sewer rent at present is \$1.00 for ordinary connections.

The University will provide without cost to the town of Chapel Hill water for the flush tanks of the system, embracing the Franklin and Rosemary Street lines as at present laid, and the new sewerage system just surveyed for the town of Chapel Hill by Prof. M. H. Stacy, described and submitted in his report to the aldermen of the town of Chapel Hill in his communication to the Board of Aldermen at their meeting on January 11, 1911.
