

Chapel Hill, N.C.

July 5, 1912.

The Regular Monthly Meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held in the Mayor's Office at 8 P.M.

Mayor Robinson in the Chair and all of the Board present.

Upon Motion of Embury seconded by Piesford the Mayor was Authorized to borrow for the town for 90 days \$1000⁰⁰ to complete the extension of the sewer line.

Upon Motion the Claim of Gilbert Chubeli and J. H. Stuylenmuller was referred to the Finance Committee, with power to act.

Upon Motion 100⁰⁰ was appropriated to defray the expenses of the fire Co to the tournament at Fayetteville, provided Mr. M. Chuck Chairman, Fire Co. accompany them.

Upon Motion the following ordinance goes into effect at once:

No person shall charge more than 25¢ for a passenger and 25¢ for a trunk hauled from the depot and delivered anywhere in town. No charge shall be made for a hat bag or suit case accompanying a passenger. This ordinance does not apply to traveling salesmen carrying excess baggage.

Any violation of this ordinance shall be fined \$100 for each offence.

The following resolution offered by Dr. Herty was adopted:

ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

1. That all persons owning or using a privy within the corporate limits of the town of Chapel Hill shall have the same removed or remodeled so as to be sanitary on or before the first day of September, 1912. A privy will not be considered sanitary unless it is fly-proof: privies are to be made fly-proof by putting a close fitting hinged door behind and drop lids over each hole in the seat.

2. All persons are forbidden, after the 10th day of June, 1912, to erect within the corporate limits of the town, any privy without the written permission of the Health Officer of the town. All persons are forbidden to erect any dwelling, or house for business purposes, on any street within the corporate limits of the town, within 300 feet of the sewer, without making connection with the sewer for at least one water closet, unless impossible because of grade.

3. No person shall be allowed to dispose of the contents of any privy, within the limits now served by town wagon but the town shall have an authorized agent who shall at stated intervals collect the contents of all privies and carry said contents to a point at least one half mile from town, to a place designated by the Health Officer. The town charges 50 cents per month for each privy for such service.

4. All persons owning stables within the corporate limits of the town shall keep them in a sanitary condition. No stable shall be erected within the corporate limits of the town, after the enactment of this act, without the written consent of the Health Officer. He shall have power to refuse such consent when in his judgment such stable will be detrimental to the health of the community, or offensive to those residing in said neighborhood.

5. On and after the first day of September, 1912, no surface privy shall be maintained within 350 feet of Franklin St., along that part traversed by the sewer.

Every person, firm or corporation maintained a stable or stables a privy or privies, without fully complying with the requirements of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of one (\$1) dollar for every day for each and every stable or privy so maintained, kept or used.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and from the 10th day of June, 1912, and shall be published once a week for four weeks in "THE NEWS" and a copy of same posted at the post-office.

On and after Jan. 1st, 1913, no hogs shall be kept within the corporate limits of the town south of a line two hundred feet north of Posemaay St. Every person violating this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of \$1.00 for every day a hog is kept in this district.
