AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE REGISTRATION OF CERTAIN PERSONS NOT ENGAGED IN USEFUL WORK.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of _

Sec. 1. That it shall be the duty of every male person between the ages of eighteen and fifty, temporarily or permanently residing in the City of ... who is not engaged in some useful and productive work or employment, to appear at the police station in the City Hall, within twenty days after the passage of this ordinance and register his name, age, address, the kind of work he can best do, and such other information as he may be asked to give by the chief of police or other police officer.

Sec. 2. That it shall be the duty of every male person, within the above ages, hereafter coming into the city or now residing in the city, who shall be without useful or productive occupation or employment for a period of five days and shall not by the end of that time obtain other work or employment, to register at the police station in the manner provided for the persons mentioned in Section 1.

Sec. 3. That any person who registers as provided in either of the foregoing sections, and thereafter secures work or employment, shall report such fact immediately to the chief of police or other officer on duty at the police station.

Sec. 4. That Sections 1, 2, and 3 of this ordinance shall not apply to persons who are invalids or cripples, or sick and under the care of a physician; or to persons as are physically unable to do any cind of work or labor, and shall furnish to the chief of police a certificate of a physician to such effect.

Sec. 5. That it shall be the duty of the chief of police to provide suitable books or blanks for the registration of persons as provided in this ordinance and to superintend such registration, but such persons may be registered by any member of the police department on duty at the police station. For this purpose there is hereby established at the office of the chief of police the Municipal Labor and Employment Bureau, with the chief of police as superintendent thereof. The chief of police and other officers in charge of said bureau shall communicate with persons using labor or in need of help, particularly manufacturers, contractors, and wholesale and retail dealers in necessary commodities, and shall keep a record of requests for employees or laborers, and endeavor to place registrants in some suitable work or employment with those in need of employees or laborers.

Sec. 6. That any able-bodied person who may be offered work or employment through said Municipal Labor and Employment Bureau, and who at the time of said offer is still unengaged in any useful or productive employment or occupation, and who, under such conditions, shall refuse work thus offered him without good cause for such refusal, shall be reported to the prosecuting attorney of the Municipal Court, and the failure or refusal of any person, under such circumstances, to accept employment or work, shall be prima facie evidence of his guilt in a prosecution for vagrancy.

Sec. 7. That any person required to register at the police station by this ordinance who shall fail or neglect so to register within the time above prescribed, shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollar and each and every day's failure so to register shall constitute a separate and distinct offense,

Sec. 8. The term "useful and productive work" (occupation or employment) shall be construed to mean any work, occupation or employment that is legitimate and now recognized as useful or necessary, and which is engaged in by any particular person for the whole or the greater part of the usual number of working hours, and which yields to such person a compensation or profit sufficient to support him and his dependents.

Sec. 9. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage.
