There was a call meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill at 12 Noon, Mayor Council presiding and with the following Aldermen present, to wit: G. M. Braune, P. L. Burch, M. E. Hogan, and B. S. Thompson.

The Mayor brought up for discussion the proposed development property by Mr. Paul Green in the rear of Mr. Sorrell's property on Franklin Street and pointed out that the construction of buildings in this area and the whole subdivision of property in accordance with Mr. Green's plans was contrary to the provisions of the zoning ordinance, but stated further that the subdivision of this property by Mr. Green had been made in 1924, and consequently, that he had ruled

Mr. Green would not be prohibited from constructing houses in accordance with his predetermined plans contrary to the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance. After discussion, this ruling by the Manager Was upheld.

The Manager presented the following petition from the property owners on Roberson Street which is self explanatory.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen, Chapel Hill, N. C.

We, the undersigned, property owners on Roberson Street between Franklin Street and Cameron Avenue, do respectfully petition you to have a sidewalk constructed along the west side of the said Roberson Street between the limits designated.

The Manager explained that this petition was presented on account of fact that Mr. B. S. Williams was in the act of constructing a garage building on the Northwest corner of the intersec-

tion of Roberson with Franklin Street which construction would practically make it impossible to build a sidewalk on the West side of this street. There was much discussion by the members of the Board regarding this matter, and upon motion of Alderman Braune, Seconded by Alderman Thomspon, the following resolution was duly adopted, all the Alderman present voting in the affirmative therefor:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Chapel Hill will secure the right of way and construct a side walk along the West side of Roberson Street between Franklin Street and Cameron Avenue, provided that the property owners on this street will petition to the Board of Aldermen to construct such sidewalk and agree to reimburse the Town for all cost incurred in securing property and right of way for such sidewalk and that they will agree to give to the Town an indemnity bond as a guarantee that they will faithfully carry out their part of the petition and agreement.

The Mayor brought up for discussion the condition of the alley leading off from Columbia Street and running in the rear of the store buildings on Franklin and which was used by these places as a service alley. The Manager stated that the condition existing in this alley had been inspected by the Improvement Committee and it was the opinion of this Committee that the standing water was caused by inadequate disposal of roof drainage from the roof of these sewers. There was much discussion and upon motion of Alderman Burch, seconded by Alderman Thompson, the following resolution was duly adopted, all the Aldermen present voting in the affirmative therefor:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL:

SECTION 1. That whereas the condition of the alley in the rear of the buildings on Franklin Street owned by S. J. Brockwell, Durham Public Service Company, S. M. Pickard, Estate, and M. W. Durham, is a menager to health and whereas it is the opinion of the Board of Aldermen that condition is caused by the negligence of the property owners in not adequately taking care of the rain water which falls on their building, that the condition existing in the alley are hereby declared to be a nuisance.
