

Minutes Regular Meeting
Board of Aldermen--Chapel Hill, N. C.
August 30, 1950

The regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held in the Town Hall on August 30th at 8:00 P.M.

Present were Mayor Lanier, Aldermen Fitch, Hobbs, Burch, Fowler, and Putnam, Town Manager Rose, Town Attorney Hinshaw, and Town Auditor Peacock.

Minutes of the regular meeting of August 14th were read and approved.

Mr. Peacock reported that he had examined the vouchers for the month of July and had found them in order. He reported on a new system of records for the Chapel Hill Recorder's Court, based on the system used in Durham, North Carolina. He recommended that this system be used in the Chapel Hill Recorder's Court, but added that it would entail the expenditure of several hundred dollars. The Board instructed Mr. Peacock to work together with Mrs. Wagner, Clerk, Mr. Rose, Town Manager, and Mr. Hinshaw, Town Attorney, to set-up forms to meet the present and future needs of the Town of Chapel Hill. Mr. Peacock reported that he hoped to have the Town audit completed by the first meeting of the Board in October.

Mr. Ashbaugh, Vice-President of the Durham Dairy Products, presented an oral petition to the Board to see whether or not an alley could be cut behind the Durham Dairy Products' new building, in order for their trucks to make delivery in the rear of the store.

A written petition was read by Mr. Rose from the residents and property owners of the Hidden Hills section, requesting that the Board annex them in the same manner as they annexed the Davie-Circle, Hillcrest, and Durham Road Section. Mr. Lanier asked that the petition be acknowledged, expressing the Board's appreciation of the interest shown and assuring the residents and property owners that the Board will give the petition serious consideration as soon as possible.

Mr. Rose reported that in order to handle the garbage collection in the newly-annexed area, the Town would have to have a new dump truck. The following bids for this truck were opened and read by Mr. Rose:

After some discussion, Mr. Putnam moved that the bid from Hazzard Motor Company for a Chevrolet truck be accepted. This motion was seconded by Mr. Fowler and passed unanimously.

Mr. Rose reported that the Police cars were in bad shape and that he had bought two Ford cars from Strowd Motor Company, total net cost not to exceed \$1,500.

Mr. Lanier brought up the problem of allowing the highway busses to use the North end of Kenan Street, and whether or not the Town should bear the full expense of repairing that part of Kenan Street. Mr. Rose reported that he had allowed for a certain amount of patching on that street, and that he intended to put into effect a No Parking Lane across the street from the bus station.

Mr. Lanier also brought out the fact that, in terms of maintenance of buildings, any groups which want to use any room in the Town Hall or Recreation Center should obtain a permit. This permit to show the name of the organization, Director or Sponsor, and the purpose of the meeting. This suggestion was informally left with the Town Manager.

Mr. Rose reported on preparations for garbage collection, installation of street lights, and installation of water lines for fire hydrants for the newly-annexed area. He stated to the Board that the garbage would be collected twice a week, on Mondays and Thursdays, in this area, and that he had published a notice to that effect in the Chapel Hill Weekly.

Upon motion of Alderman Putnam, seconded by Alderman Hobbs, all members present voting in the affirmative, the following Ordinance was passed on August 30, 1950:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL:

Section 1: That all traffic approaching the various intersections in the Town of Chapel Hill which have marked traffic lanes, shall approach in the left lane if they desire to make a left-angle

turn at the intersection and shall turn squarely to the left; and if they desire to continue their journey in the same direction or make a right turn, they shall approach the intersection in the right-hand lane and after approaching the intersection in the right-hand lane, they shall either go straight ahead or turn to their right. The approach to the intersection in the right and left lanes respectively shall be a warning to the other traffic using the lane that they are going to turn as heretofore indicated.

Section 2: It shall be the duty of the Town Manager to have the left-hand lane marked "Left Only" and the right-hand lane marked "Right or Through" in large letters.

Section 3: Any person approaching the intersection in the left lane and going straight through the intersection or turning to the right shall forfeit and pay a penalty of \$10.00.

Section 4: Any person approaching the intersection in the right lane and making a short left turn will forfeit and pay a penalty of \$10.00.

Section 5: This Ordinance shall apply to the following intersections, where the Town Manager has laid out, marked, and properly designated lanes as described herein: East Franklin Street and Hillsboro Street, East Franklin Street at the Post Office, Franklin Street and Columbia Street; and South Columbia Street and Cameron Avenue; and the intersection of North Columbia and Rosemary Streets.

Section 6: This Ordinance shall become effective and in full force on and after September 15, 1950.

Mr. Rose read a letter from Mrs. Irene Lee. Mr. Burch moved that the letter and enclosed chart from Mrs. Lee be referred to the Planning Board for its recommendation. This motion was seconded by Mr. Putnam and passed unanimously.

Mr. Rose informed the Board that the printed Codes had been received, and the Board recommended that \$2.00 be charged for the complete book of Codes, and .50 for each individual book. If the book is returned, the money is to be refunded. This fee is to be charged to all persons other than architects and contractors, and the books are to be given to them without charge.

Mr. Rose was instructed to notify the Planning Committee that they would have to present their Budget for 1950-51 to the Board.

Mr. Burch moved that the new traffic light be installed at the intersection of West Cameron and Mallette Streets. Mr. Putnam seconded the motion, and it was unanimously passed.

Mr. Fitch reported that he would like to see the corner at the Carolina Inn straightened to make driving safer. No action was taken by the Board.

Mr. Hobbs asked Mr. Rose what effect the disposalls had on the sewerage lines in the Town. Mr. Rose reported that they had had no trouble as yet.

Mr. Putnam reported that his team was in the process of smoothing the street markers, and that the Town would cooperate with them in digging holes for the markers.

Mr. Lanier congratulated Mr. Fowler on being elected President of the North Carolina Food Dealer's Association.

Upon motion of Mr. Burch, seconded by Mr. Putnam, and unanimous consent, the meeting adjourned at 11:00 P.M. o'clock.

Bolin Creek Plant


Found to be functioning very nicely except for fly breeding in one bed of sludge. This was mentioned to Mr. Rose and the condition was taken care of.

Mason Farm Plant

Mosquitoes were found breeding in the by-pass bar screen and the operator was shown proper procedure to remedy the condition. Otherwise, the plant is being operated very well.


Complaints have been made about weeds on vacant lots. These complaints are being referred to the Town Hall since in most cases these conditions do not constitute a public health nuisance.
