Two compliance visits were made to each of the two milk processing plants. One visit each was made to the sewage treatment plant, the water treatment plant, and the sanitary land fill. Several complaints were investigated involving improperly functioning septic tanks and unsanitary privies. In these cases, the owners of the property were advised to connect to the sewer if at all possible or to repair the septic tanks and privies. Twenty-six privies were inspected and condemned because of unsanitary conditions.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman R. J. M. Hobbs

and seconded by Alderman P. L. Burch

and upon being put to vote, was unanimously carried:

"WHEREAS, that improvement designated by the State Highway and Public Works Commission was Project 4151, Orange County, is considered to be the most necessary improvement in the highway system in the corporate limits of this municipality for the promotion of public safety and convenience; and

"WHEREAS, in the plans and proposals of said project it is provided that this municipality cooperate with said Commission to the extent of

- (1) Participating in the cost and expense of acquiring all rights-of-way necessary for the location and construction of said project, and the removal therefrom of all obstructions of any kind or character necessary for the construction thereof, to the extent of thirty three and one-third per cent (33 1/3%), but not to exceed the total amount of \$3,500.00.
- (2) Exercising any rights which it may have under any franchises to effect the changing, adjusting, or relocating of telephone, telegraph, or electric power lines or underground cables without expense to the Commission, and, without cost to the Commission, providing for the laying, changing, relaying, or repairing of any necessary water, sewer, gas or other pipelines or conduits, together with all necessary house or lot connections or services extending to the outer edges of said project, whether made necessary by the widening of existing or construction of new or relocated streets or sidewalks.

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the said Project 4151, Orange County, be and it is hereby formally approved by the Board of Aldermen of the Municipality of Chapel Hill, and that the Mayor and Clerk of said municipality be and they are hereby empowered to sign and execute the required agreements between this municipality and the State Highway and Public Works Commission."

WHEREAS, the STATE HIGHWAY AND PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSION has prepared plans to make certain street improvements covered by the above captioned project within the MUNICIPALITY OF CHAPEL HILL, COUNTY OF ORANGE, consisting of the improvement as relocated of US Route 15 and 501 extending from Survey Station 48+66.9 to the east city limit a distance of approximately 3449 feet with right-of-way widths as follows:

1. 60 feet in width from Survey Station 48+66.9 to Survey Station 70+41.22 line back equals to Survey Station 26+25.17 line ahead.
2. 100 feet in width from Survey Station 70+41.22 line back equals to Survey Station 26+25.17 line ahead to the city limit (Survey Station 39+00).

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of said municipality has approved the construction of said improvements in accordance with said plans and has agreed to participate in the manner and to the extent hereinafter set out;

The name of any candidate for Mayor, Alderman, or Judge of the Recorder's Court shall be printed upon the official ballot, provided there is filed with the Town Clerk no less than fifteen days previous to the holding of such election, the name of each candidate and the office for which he is a candidate. After the expiration of the time for filing such notices of candidacy, the Town Clerk shall cause to be printed a sufficient number of said ballots. Provided that nothing herein shall be construed as preventing any elector from marking out any name which might appear on ballots and substituting therefor the name of any person he may favor for the respective position. When the election shall be finished the Registrar and Judges of the election shall count the ballots; and if there shall be two or more ballots rolled together or any ballots which contain the names of more persons than the elector has the right to vote for, or shall have a device or ornament upon it, such ballot shall not be numbered in counting the ballots, but shall be voided, and the counting of the votes shall be continued by the Judges until completed and the result therefor declared. Such person receiving the highest number of votes as Mayor shall be declared duly elected to such office for the ensuing term of two years; and the three persons receiving the highest number of votes, as candidates for the four year terms as Aldermen, shall be duly elected for the ensuing term; and the person receiving the highest number of votes as Judge of the Recorder's Court shall be duly elected for the ensuing term of two years. All duly elected officers will be eligible to assume office on May 9th, upon taking oath.

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Minutes Regular Meeting
Board of Alderman--Chapel Hill, N. C.
March 12, 1951

The regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held in the Town Hall on March 12, 1951 at 8:00 P.M.

Present were Mayor Lanier, Aldermen Fitch, Hobbs, Burch, Davis, Fowler, and Putnam, Town Manager Rose, and Town Attorney Hinshaw.

The minutes of the regular meeting of February 26, 1951 were approved as read and corrected. The minutes of the special meeting of March 5, 1951 were approved as read and corrected.

Mr. Rose brought up the 1951 Town Election Ordinance for adoption. After the Clerk read this to the members of the Board, and it was discussed in full, Mr. Fitch moved that the following Ordinance be adopted. This motion was seconded by Mr. Putnam and unanimously passed.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL:

Section 1. Pursuant to the Charter of the Town of Chapel Hill and the General Laws of the State of North Carolina governing elections in municipalities, an election is hereby called to be held on Tuesday, May 8, 1951 for the purpose of electing a Mayor, three Aldermen and the Judge of the Recorder's Court, the Mayor to serve for a term of two years, three Aldermen to serve for a term of four years and the Judge of the Recorder's Court to serve for a term of two years.

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five Section 3. The name of any candidate for Mayor, Alderman, or Judge of the Recorder's Court shall be printed upon the official ballot, provided there is filed with the Town Clerk no less than fifteen days previous to the holding of such election, the name of each candidate and the office for which he is a candidate. After the expiration of the time for filing such notices of candidacy, the Town Clerk shall cause to be printed a sufficient number of said ballots. Provided that nothing herein shall be construed as preventing any elector from marking out any name which might appear on such

ballots and substituting therefor the name of any person he may favor for the respective position. When the election shall be finished the Registrar and Judges of the election shall count the ballots; and if there shall be two or more ballots rolled together or any ballots which contain the names of more persons than the elector has the right to vote for, or shall have a device or ornament upon it, such ballot shall not be numbered in counting the ballots, but shall be voided, and the counting of the votes shall be continued by the Judges until completed and the result therefor declared. Such person receiving the highest number of votes as Mayor shall be declared duly elected to such office for the ensuing term of two years; and the three persons receiving the highest number of votes, as candidates for the four year terms as Aldermen, shall be duly elected for the ensuing term; and the person receiving the highest number of votes as Judge of the Recorder's Court shall be duly elected for the ensuing term of two years. All duly elected officers will be eligible to assume office on May 9th, upon taking the oath.

Section 4. That the place of holding the election is hereby designated as the Fire Department in the Town Hall on the Northwest corner at the intersection of Rosemary and Columbia Streets.

Section 5. That D. J. Howard is hereby designated and appointed Registrar for this election, and Mrs. Paul Robertson and Mrs. J. F. Crawford are hereby designated and appointed judges of this election who before entering upon the discharge of their duties shall take oath before any person authorized by law to administer oaths, to conduct the elections fairly and impartially, according to the constitution and laws of the State of North Carolina, and the Charter of the Town of Chapel Hill.

Section 6. For the purpose of voting at said election, the registration books shall be open for registration of any new electors beginning on April 21st and continuing through April 28th (except Sunday) at the Chapel Hill Fire Department in the Town Hall. The registration book shall be open on each Saturday from 9:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. and on each day of said election period, except Saturday, from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

That Saturday April 28th will be Challenge Day. That the registration for this election shall close on Saturday, April 28th. and that this Ordinance shall be posted in three public places.

Mr. James R. Farlow, representing the American Legion, came before the Board with an application to obtain a license to sell beer in the American Legion Hut on East Rosemary Street. Mr. Farlow

stated that their primary purpose for selling beer is to use the profits for the advancement of youth work in the community. He stated that a committee of three would be appointed to supervise the operation of the hut, and that for the time being the beer would be sold only on certain nights in the week. Mr. Hobbs was of the opinion that a sizeable group of Legionnaires should come before the Board to request this permit, as Mr. Farlow had stated that at the time this was voted on, not more than 10 or 15 members were present. Mr. Burch suggested that the American Legion get a majority of their members to petition or come before the Board to show just how many of the people want the license. Mr. Hobbs moved that this matter be deferred for further consideration. This motion was seconded by Mr. Putnam. The following Aldermen voted for this motion, Fitch, Hobbs, and Putnam--voting against the motion were Aldermen Davis, Fowler, and Burch, resulting in a tie vote. Mr. Lanier voted to defer consideration, therefore, the motion was carried.

Mr. Rose presented an application from Michael G. Pappas to sell beer at 103 Henderson Street. Mr. Burch questioned the issuance of this permit because of the place of business's nearness to the Presbyterian Church. Mr. Putnam moved that the granting of Michael G. Pappas's application for a beer permit be deferred until clarification of the Ordinance providing that beer not be sold in businesses located a certain distance from churches. This motion was seconded by Mr. Fitch and passed unanimously.

Mr. Rose read an application made by Edwin E. Johnson and William Paul Stephens to sell beer at the Curve Inn. Mr. Putnam moved that this application be deferred until proper investigation can be made of the applicants. This motion was seconded by Mr. Fowler and unanimously passed.

Mr. Rose read a letter from Mrs. F. W. Hanft requesting a street light on the Bowling Creek Road. It was suggested that the Town Manager investigate this request and report back to the Board.

The Health Department's Report for the month of February, 1951 was read by Mr. Rose. Mr. Hobbs suggested that the Town Manager find out what the Health Officer does about people with very high bacteria count in the milk they sell.

A copy of the Clerk of the Recorder's Court and the Police Department's Reports for the month of February, 1951 was handed to each member present.

Mr. Rose reported that he had had a letter dated March 9, 1951 from T. A. Burton, Division Engineer, North Carolina State Highway Commission, stating that the Town could use money from the City Code Fund to pay the State Highway Commission for one-third the cost of the right of way inside the town limits, total cost not to exceed \$3,500.00.

Resolution and Agreement with the Town of Chapel Hill and the North Carolina State Highway Commission attached hereto as an official part of these minutes.

Mr. Rose also reported that he had a letter from Mr. W. E. Easterline stating that during this fiscal year the Town of Chapel Hill can issue \$16,000 in bonds, and that after July, 1951, can issue another \$6,000 in bonds. He suggested that the Town issue \$16,000 in short-term notes, dated May 15, 1951, then, after July 1, 1951, issue \$22,000 in bonds and pay off the note.

Mr. Rose presented a map and survey made of the town limits and stated he was ready to file them with the Secretary of State in Raleigh, North Carolina and the Register of Deeds in Hillsboro, North Carolina. Mr. Lanier congratulated Mr. Rose on having this map and survey made. It was the sentiment of the Board that any new property owner found to be in the old town limits, according to the survey, should start paying taxes as of January 1, 1951, and that taxes not be retroactive prior to that date.

Mr. Rose reported that the bill authorizing the Town of Chapel Hill to appoint an Assistant Tax Collector had passed the House of Representatives.

Mr. Rose reported that \$2,220.00 in delinquent taxes had been collected during the months of January and February and to March 12, 1951. He also added that about 81% of the 1950 taxes had been collected as of March 12, 1951.

Mr. Hobbs stated that he had talked with Mr. Umstead about zoning four miles outside the city limits, and that Mr. Umstead says that there seems to be some apprehension in Raleigh about the zoning being valid, but says that the Bill would be valid if the bill gave the County the right to zone four miles outside the town limits of Chapel Hill.

Mr. Putnam made the motion that the City Manager be authorized to spend not in excess of \$50.00 to get the preliminary work done on the Ordinances of the Town, the money to be taken out of the Contingency Fund. This motion was seconded by Mr. Hobbs and unanimously passed.

Mr. Lanier reported that he hoped to see the Chairman of the Street Naming Committee on Wednesday and find out at that time when the Committee would be ready to make their report to the Board.

Mr. Lanier inquired of the members of the Board whether they wanted to have a Mayor and six members of the Board, or seven members of the Board with a Chairman. When the Mayor asked the members about this, no one expressed any desire for such a change in the Charter.

Upon motion of Mr. Putnam, seconded by Mr. Davis and unanimous consent, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 P.M. o'clock.
