In re: Application for Beer Permit By Edwin Johnson For use at "The Curve Inn" Chapel Hill, N. C.

As Mayor of Chapel Hill I respectfully and earnestly ask that you withhold action on Mr. Johnson's application until the Board of Aldermen of Chapel Hill have had an opportunity to reconsider the Board's March 29 action in grenting Mr. Johnson Chapel Hill's beer permit. The Chapel Hill Board of Aldermen meet again on May 14, 8:00 P. M.

Chapel Hill's permit was issued on March 29. On April 9 the Board of Aldermen unanimously adopted the Chapel Hill Town Flanning Board's unanimous recommendation that all the area annexed to Chapel Hill (including the Curve Inn section) in August, 1950, be somed as "Residential Area -10". That is the equivalent of residence some A. A small section of this annexed area - one of the Town's sewage disposal sites was somed "Industrial".

The effect of that zoning Act adopted by the Board on April 9 is that no new business house may be opened in this Residential Area - 10. Any business house there on April 9 may continue operating, unless the building is destroyed or the business operation ceases for 180 days.

After April 9 many of the residents in the new area zoned Residential Area - 10 petitioned your office not to grant the State's beer permit.

Therefore, I hope and urge that you withhold action until the Chapel Hill Board of Aldermon has an opportunity to reconsider this matter and to hear from the petitioners opposing and the petitioners favoring the granting a permit to Mr. Johnson to sell beer at the Curve Inn.

# Minutes Regular Meeting Board of Aldermen--Chapel Hill, N. C. May 14, 1951

The regular meeting of the Board of Alderman was held in the Town Hall on May 14, 1951 at 7:30 P.M.

Mayor Pro-Tem R. J. M. Hobbs presided and Aldermen present were Fitch, Burch, Davis, Putnam, and Cornwell. Mayor Lanier was also present, as was Town Manager Rose and Town Attorney Hinshaw.

 $\,$  Minutes of the regular meeting of April 23, 1951 were read and approved.

Results of the May 8, 1951 Municipal Election were read by the Clerk.

The following newly elected and re-elected officials took the oaths of office, administered by Mr. E. M. Lynch, Clerk of the Superior Court:

Mr. E. S. Lanier, Mayor for 1951-53 Mr. P. L. Burch, Alderman for 1951-55 Mr. G. Obie Davis, Alderman for 1951-55 Mr. Oliver K. Cornwell, Alderman for 1951-55

Mayor Pro-Tem turned the meeting over to Mayor Lanier and the roll was called.

Mr. Lanier asked the Reverend W. M. Howard, Jr., pastor of the Methodist Church, to lead the group in prayer.

Mr. Lanier welcomed the visitors and stated that it was encouraging to see so many of the citizens taking an interest in the government of the Town. Mr. Lanier expressed his appreciation to the members of the Board, the Town Manager, and Judge Manning for the fine cooperation they had shown in working with him during the past two years, and expressed the desire that this cooperation could continue in the future years. The following is a check list of work that Mr. Lanier said the Board would consider in the next two years, and that he hoped that they would be able to get something done about them:

(1) strengthen the police force, see that our fire protection facilities are adequate, and check on traffic safety

May 14, 1951

(2) keep sidewalks clean and start paving program for sidewalks

(3) let Mr. Rose begin work on a tax map

(4) work with the State Highway and Public Works Commission in getting the streets in better condition and keeping them in good condition

(5) examine salaries of Town employees

(6) check on out-of-date equipment being used by Town forces

(7) get more cemetery space (8) enlarge legal services

(9) secure a printed code of ordinances

(10) adopt a retirement plan of some kind for employees or put them under Social Security

(11) adopt zoning regulations for surburban areas on bases of recommendations of Planning Board Enlarged

- (12) continued support of Recorder's Court by providing permanent record books
- (13) effort to acquire additional play ground space for recreational facilities for children and young people
- (14) annexation program by sections and on a sound financial bases

(15) encourage and help keep Chapel Hill clean and beautiful

(16) modernize the municipal election registration book

(17) study additions to the Town Hall.

A short recess was announced by Mayor Lanier and when the meeting was again called to order, the Board considered the written application of L. H. Merritt to serve beer at the Club Sirloin on West Franklin Street in Chapel Hill. Upon recommendation of Chief Sloan and Mr. Rose, Mr. Davis moved that the permit be granted to L. H. Merritt to sell beer on-premises at the Club Sirloin on West Franklin Street, Chapel Hill, N. C. This motion was seconded by Mr. Putnam and unanimously passed.

Mr. Rose read the application of Robert Lee Freeman to sell beer at Freeman's Snack Bar at 412 West Franklin Street, Chapel Hill, N. C. Chief Sloan said that Mr. Freeman was about 75 years of age and that he did not think that he was physically able to handle younger people drinking beer, and also that the building is not in a condition to operate such a place. Mr. Putnam moved that action on this application be deferred for further study. This motion was seconded by Mr. Burch and unanimously passed.

Mr. R. B. Vaughan and other residents of the newly annexed area of Chapel Hill came before the Board to ask the Board to reconsider its action on the beer permit issued to Edwin E. Johnson to sell beer at the Curve Inn on the Durham Road. Mr. Lanier read a letter

May 14, 1951

that he had written to Mr. C. A. Upchurch of the Malts Beverage Division on May 2, 1951 asking the State to withhold action on this permit until the Board had had an opportunity to reconsider the question if the members of the Board desired to do so. Mr. Melton Burk, Roxboro, N. C., attorney for Dr. S. A. Nathan, owner of the Curve Inn, represented his client in the discussion. He reminded the members of the Board that after the license has been granted, the Board does not have the power to rescind the license until there is some violation of the law. Mr. Cornwell moved that the legal status of the permit be clarified before the Board takes action of any kind on this matter. This motion was seconded by Mr. Fitch and passed unanimously.

The Town Attorney was also asked to find out whether or not the Town has the power to act on any beer license before the State has acted on same.

The Police and Clerk of the Recorder's Court reports for the month of April, 1951 were handed to each member present.

The Health Department's report for the month of April, 1951 was read by Mr. Rose.

Mr. Rose reported that he had discussed the installation of curb and gutter for McCauley Street between Pittsboro Street and Pittsboro Road with Mrs. T. E. Best and the University, and that both were in favor of it. The Chi Phi Fraternity, however, wanted the Town to leave the stone curb along their frontage. He also reported that the University would like to have the street widened and straightened, and requested a detailed survey of the street for consideration by the Building and Ground Committee of the University.

Mr. Rose reported that the Durham Dairy Products manager was anxious to have an alley opened behind their building on East Franklin Street, and that an easement had been circulated to all of the property owners affected by this alley and that all of them had signed the easement with the exception of Mr. Abernethy and Mr. Basnight. Mr. Rose reported that there was nothing now that the Town could do unless it was possible to condemn the area. The letter written by Mr. Basnight refusing to sign the easement was read by Mr. Rose.

Mr. Burch asked if there was not an ordinance requiring all businesses to have an open driveway behind their buiddings, and if not, what legal power does the Board have to require open driveways behind businesses? These questions were turned over to the Town Attorney for a report at the next meeting of the Board.

May 14, 1951

Mr. Rose explained that the Powell Bill provided for the State to furnish money for use on the streets, and that half of the money would be based on the proportion that the population of the Town of Chapel Hill bears to the total population of all municipalities in the State of North Carolina, and that the other half would be based on the proportion of mileage of those streets in each municipality not a part of the State Highway System. Mr. Rose reported that the letter had been acknowledge, stating that the Town has had a municipal election since May, 1947, and is currently imposing an ad-valorem tax. He also reported that the Town would have to have prepared an adequate street map showing definitely the Town limits, and a certified actual mileage of streets not included in the State Highway System. Mr. Rose reminded the members that the Town had a new map showing the Town limits, and that Mr. John R. Gove, Engineer, was in the process of finding the actual mileage of the streets so that this information could be sent to Raleigh before August 1, 1951. Mr. Lanier stated that the money from the Powell Bill would have to be put in a special Powell Bill Account and that each member of the Board is personally liable for any unauthorized spending of this money.

Mr. Rose reported that the Pendergraft case against the Town had been put off until Wednesday morning, May 16, 1951 when it will be heard in Superior Court in Hillsboro, North Carolina.

Mr. Rose reported that the bid on the \$16,000 note had been awarded to the Bank of Chapel Hill at no interest until September 15. Mr. Cornwell moved that the Town Manager express for the Board their thanks for the Bank's handling of the note. This motion was seconded by Mr. Putnam and passed unanimously.

Without objection, the subject of back water valves was turned over to the Town Manager and the Health, Welfare, and Housing Committee.

Mr. Rose read a letter from William M. Alexander, President of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, asking that the Town allow one of its fire trucks to be in the Armed Forces parade on Wednesday, May 16, 1951. The Board voiced its approval on this request.

Mr. Davis brought up the question of a stop sign at the intersection of McCauley Street and Ransom Street. The Town Manager was asked to check on this and report back at the next meeting of the Board.

Mr. Fitch stated that he thought an article in the Chapel Hill Weekly on the parking situation on Pickard Lane had done a lot of good, and that the street looks much better now.

Mr. Putnam asked the Board to consider the ditch in front of Joe Barbee's home. He reported that the plans for the recreation center had been found and he now has them in his possession. Mr. Rose reported that a picture of the front of the building was in his office in the Town Hall.

Upon motion of Mr. Burch, seconded by Mr. Putnam and unanimous consent, the meeting adjourned at 9:45 P.M. O'clock.
