- That the contract between the Town of Chapel Hill and the l. Housing and Home Finance Agency be and the same hereby approved.
- That the Mayor and the Town Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to sign and execute the said contract for and on behalf of the Town of Chapel Hill and forward the same to the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

Upon motion of Alderman Strowd, seconded by Alderman Robinson, said resolution was unanimously passed.

## Auditor's Report

Checked May vouchers and found them to be in order. Tax collection through May, 1963--92.91%.

#### Police Car

Town Manager stated he received two bids for a police car: Yates Motor Company -- \$2,177.42; Crowell Little Motor Company -- \$2,421.19.

Alderman Strowd moved that the Town accept the low bid. Seconded by Alderman Robinson and unanimously carried.

# Hillsboro Street

Alderman Giduz asked if a rock wall would be built back of the curb on Hillsboro Street. Town Manager Peck stated it would if needed.

Mrs. Coenen stated that she wished the Board would see their way to leave a two foot sidewalk on the east side of Hillsboro Street.

Town Manager Peck stated that this could not be done unless the property owners would give additional right-of-way to lay a sidewalk.

Alderman Robinson moved that the street committee look at this July 9, 1963 at 9:00 A.M. Alderman Strowd seconded this which was unanimously carried.

Alderman Wager moved the meeting be adjourned. Seconded by Alderman lage. David B. Roberts

Minutes

Board of Aldermen

Town of Chapel Hill, N.C.

A regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill, North Carolina, was held at the Town Hall, the regular place of meeting, at 7:30 o'clock, P.M., on July 23, 1963.

Present: Mayor pro tem Roland Giduz, presiding, and Aldermen Wager, Strowd, Robinson, and Page.

Absent: Mayor McClamroch and Alderman Walters.

At the hour of 7:30 o'clock, P.M., the Mayor announced that, pursuant to notice duly published, this was the place, date and time for a public hearing concerning the acquisition, construction, operation and maintenance of an off-street parking facility to be located on the south side of East Rosemary Street approximately midway between Columbia Street and Henderson Street and the issuance of \$60,000 revenue bonds of the Town therefor.

The Mayor pro tem then announced that the Board of Aldermen would hear any resident of the Town of Chapel Hillor any other interested person concerning such off-street parking facility and the issuance of revenue bonds therefor.

At said hearing a substantial number of citizens, merchants, property owners and taxpayers were present and participated, including representatives of various civic and business associations, and full opportunity was given to all persons present to be heard. John Foushee, representing the Parking Association, Joe Augustine, Executive Secretary of the Merchants Association and Ross Scroggs, Chairman of the Planning Board, each spoke in support of the project. In addition the Town Manager presented certain facts and the

results of studies and analyses which had been made of the traffic and vehicular on-street parking probleme in the central business district of the Town. Police Chief William Blake spoke concerning the traffic problem and the need for additional parking facilities. No resident of the Town of Chapel Hill or other interested person appeared, either in person or by attorney, to protest against the establishment of an off-street parking facility and the Town Clerk and Treasurer announced that no protest in writing had been presented.

Thereupon Alderman Strowd introduced the following resolution which was read:

RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE HOLDING OF A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF AN OFF-STREET PARKING FACILITY IN THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL AND THE ISSUANCE OF \$80,000 REVENUE BONDS OF THE TOWN THEREFOR, AND THE MAKING OF FINDINGS AND DETERMINATIONS CONCERNING SUCH PARKING FACILITY

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby finds, determines and declares:

- (a) That substantially all of the parking spaces now available in the central business district of the Town of Chapel Hill are in use at all times during the average business day.
- (b) That there is presently a deficit in the number of parking spaces required to meet the minimum demands for the average day's parking in the central business district of the Town, which deficit is expected to increase materially as a result of the normal growth of such area.
- (c) That traffic congestion has greatly increased in the central business district, bottlenecks have resulted at a number of intersections and it is almost impossible for vehicles to move through the area in an orderly, steady and efficient manner.
- (d) That in April of 1961, Mr. Samuel C. Hodges, Jr., Planning Consultant, in the Report of the Chapel Hill Improvement Commission reported the results of his study of the existing traffic and parking problems in the Town, recommending immediate and positive action toward relieving the rapidly growing parking and traffic problem and specifically recommending the acquisition of additional off-street public parking spaces.
- (e) That business requires parking facilities for its existence, and it also requires that traffic be permitted to move in an orderly and expeditious way and that traffic snarls and congestion be eliminated as completely as is reasonably possible.
- (f) That all streets in the central business district of the Town are now being utilized at or near peak capacity and additional capacity can best be obtained by a reduction of on-street parking.
- (g) That if traffic volume cannot increase because of inability of the streets and parking facilities in the central business district to take care of the present and the projected increases in traffic in the area there will result a stagnation of the area and an unhealthy decentralization of business from the area, either of which results would adversely and seriously affect property values, tax measures and the general living standards of the Town and its inhabitants.
- (h) That traffic congestion on the streets in the central business district of the Town creates hazardous and unsafe conditions for both motorists and pedestrians, and in addition impedes the proper and expeditious use of the streets by Fire and Police Department vehicles engaged upon official business, and is a serious detriment to the health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town.
- (i) That vehicular traffic in the Town is increasing and that it is expected that the Town will require 2,612 spaces for the parking of vehicles in the central business district by 1980, requiring off-street parking facilities for 2,260 vehicles.

- (j) That the Town does not now have any public off-street parking facilities in the central business district and that available private off-street parking facilities are used primarily for monthly parking and reserved parking for customers.
- (k) That the Town proposes to acquire property located on the south side of East Rosemary Street approximately midway between Columbia Street and Henderson Street and to construct thereon an off-street parking facility containing approximately 70 spaces.
- (1) That the acquisition and construction of the proposed off-street parking facility by the Town will aid materially in facilitating the traffic flow and eliminating traffic congestion on the streets in the central business district and is therefore a public necessity and convenience and in the public interest, and is a necessary and proper public and municipal purpose of the Town.
- (m) That the issuance of \$80,000 revenue bonds to finance such acquisition and construction is in the public interest, and is a necessary and proper public and municipal purpose of the Town.

Section 2. This resolution shall become effective upon its passage.

Alderman Strowd moved the passage of the foregoing resolution mentitled: "RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE HOLDING OF A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF AN OFF-STREET PARKING FACILITY IN THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL AND THE ISSUANCE OF \$80,000 REVENUE BONDS OF THE TOWN THEREFOR, AND THE MAKING OF FINDINGS AND DETERMINATIONS CONCERNING SUCH PARKING FACILITY" and Alderman Wager seconded the motion and the resolution was passed by the following vote"

#### Minutes

Alderman Wager moved that the minutes of the meeting of July 8, 1963, be approved as corrected. Alderman Page seconded this motion which was unanimouslymcarried.

# Human Relations +

Mayor pro tem Giduz read the following resolution:

In the absence of Mayor Sandy McClamroch, the Mayor pro tem of the Town of Chapel Hill has been asked by representatives of (1)the Mayor's Committee on Human Relations, (2) the Chapel Hill Committee for Open Business, (3) the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Merchants Association, and (4) the Chapel Hill Police Department, to make the following public statement on the basis of a meeting held on Monday afternoon, July 23, between these four groups.

In the over-all interests of the community of Chapel Hill, the Committee for Open Business has ceased protest demonstrations, picketing, and acts of civil disobedience in its campaign for the elimination of racial discrimination in private business service inChapel Hill.

As a direct result of this action one businessman, James Botsford of Botsford Radio and Television Service, has already announced that he is immediately returning to his former policy of non-discriminatory business service to all persons, having recently changed this policy as a personal protest against integration demonstrations.

The Chapel Hill--Carrboro Merchants Association, likewise in the over-all interests of the community, will not press charges against the 21 members of the Committee for Open Business who were arrested last Friday, July 19, while committing acts of civil disobedience, on warrants signed by an Association official.

The Chapel Hill Police Department desiring to cooperate in the spirit of the decisions of the Merchants Association and the Committee for Open Business, is recommending a nol pros with leave on charges brought by policemen against Committee for Open Business members during recent demonstrations and acts of civil disobedience on Friday, July 19.

Trial of all defendants arrested in recent acts of civil disobedience has been continued at least two weeks, until August 6, because of the absence until that scheduled session of court of Chapel Hill Recorder's Court Judge William S. Stewart.

It is hoped that the court in its good judgement will feel that the recommendations of the Police Department and the Merchants Association, as noted above, are in the best interests of the community, and that it will be moved to act in a similar spirit.

All of these defendants have agreed to the posting of bond and as of this morning have been released from jail.

The Committee for Open Business has called a meeting for Thursday of next week, August 1, for the purpose of evaluating progress in this general situation to date, and in the hope that there will be such progress made by that time that it will still at that time feel further demonstrations unnecessary to its objectives. The Committee further feels that if it does decide to return to the technique of lawful public demonstrations that it will schedule these in advance in cooperation with law enforcement authorities.

The Human Relations Committee, the Merchants Association, the Committee for Open Business, and the Police Department, are all anxious to set up a favorable atmosphere for current negotiations between a committee of private businessmen appointed by the Mayor and the owners of business firms who are being asked to offer equal service to all persons.

The aforementioned four groups offer their good wishes to the private negotiating committee and to the owners of the business firms directly involved, in the hope that they will be able to make progress toward this goal in the very near future. In any way that this private committee and the business firms feel that these four groups—and any Chapel Hill municipal agency—can further attain this objective, their efforts in this respect are wholeheartedly pledged.

This private negotiating committee met yesterday in closed session with some of the businessmen involved, and a spokesman for this committee states that it feels it is making progress.

The meeting of community leaders held last Sunday under sponsership of the Human Relations Committee brought forth many constructive suggestions for reaching this goal. A statement on progress that may be made by the various concerned groups during this current week is expected to be made at another such private meeting this Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m. in the Town Hall, again under the sponsorship of the Mayor's Committee on Human Relations. The four groups that met together yesterday to discuss the current situation all endorse the effort being made to bring the entire community to the point of mutual concern with and participation in the elimination of racial discrimination in this community, It is felt that there may be various ways in which this matter may be approached and these may be explored at next Sunday's meeting.

Your Mayor pro tem was asked to join with representatives of the above-mentioned four groups at their meeting yesterday. The meeting was marked by a spirit of determination to charitably resolve previous differences and move forward together toward a common goal. None of us feel we are "victors" in the decisions reached to date. But all of us are convinced that the entire community of Chapel Hill will be the victor over a long-standing problem that concerns us all if the present spirit of negotiation, free communication, and understanding can be continued and enlarged, in keeping with the public policy of the Town of Chapel Hill, which does not recognize nor sanction racial discrimination.

As Mayor pro tem, and speaking, I am certain, with the endorsement of Mayor Sandy McClamroch---and also, I trust, with the backing of the other members of the Chapel Hill Board of Aldermen---I appeal to all citizens of the greater community of Chapel Hill to join with us in creating from this problem an opportunity to make Chapel Hill a better place for all of us to live in.

Rev. Loren Mead, Chairman of the Human Relations Committee, said the people involved seemed to be acting in good faith. "The test of good faith is what we do now. The responsibility for ending racial discrimination rests with the entire community not just with the negotiating groups or the 14 businessmen who continue segregation policy.

Alderman Wager stated that the report was most encouraging. Alderman Wager made a motion for the Board of Aldermen to ask the Institute of Government to investigate the constitutionality and potential effectiveness of a public accommodation ordinance. Alderman Page seconded this which was unanimously carried.

# Budget Ordinance

Dr. Garvin asked for a continued appropriation of the same amount from the Town of Chapel Hill for public health. He stated that Chapel Hill was the only town contributing and it was not compulsory. Alderman Robinson made a motion that the Town give \$750.00 to the health department. Alderman Strowd seconded this which was unanimously carried.
