MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL, MUNICIPAL BUILDING, MONDAY, NOVEMBER 25, 1985, 7:30 P.M.

Mayor Joseph L. Nassif called the meeting to order. Council Members present were:

### Petitions

George Tate, speaking as a citizen, petitioned Council to modify his special use permit, granted in 1983, requiring the applicant to pave with curb and gutter the section of road in front of the property. He said that since the granting of the special use permit the State has agreed to repave Merritt Mill Road including that area in front of his property.

COUNCIL MEMBER KAWALEC MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER PASQUINI TO RECEIVE THE PETITION AND REFER TO THE MANAGER TO REPORT BACK TO COUNCIL.

Council Member Smith agreed that the Town should not require applicants to pave with curb and gutter those sections of road maintained by the State.

THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

Mr. Mel Rashkis, speaking as one of the owners of Chandler's Green Subdivision asked to speak to item #10, street widths in Chandler's Green.

Joe Herzenberg, speaking as a citizen, asked to speak to item #11a, Library expansion.

Manager Taylor petitioned Council to add item 19i, a resolution correcting the ordinance and resolution numbers, to the agenda. There were no objections.

## Minutes

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COUNCIL MEMBER SMITH MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON TO ADOPT THE MINUTES OF NOVEMBER 12, 1985 AS CIRCULATED. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER SMITH TO ADOPT THE MINUTES OF NOVEMBER 18, 1985 AS CORRECTED.THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

## General Remarks By Mayor Nassif

Mayor Nassif read a resolution of appreciation for Council Member Beverly Kawalec for her years of service to the Town. The resolution enumerated her many accomplishments as a member of the Chapel Hill Town Council. Council Member Kawalec replied by expressing thanks to the Mayor and Council, Town staff, and Council Advisory Boards for their work and dedication to the Town.

Council Member Kawalec then read a resolution of appreciation for Mayor Nassif for his years of service as Council Member and Mayor of the Town of Chapel Hill. The resolution included many of his accomplishments while in office.

Mayor Nassif addressed the Council stating that he was proud to have served with the Council, that he felt the Council had performed their duties in the proper manner and had voted their convictions. He encouraged the Council not to spend too much time deliberating new zoning and development ordinances but to chose a Development Ordinance that the Council felt comfortable with and to go on from there. He said he was afraid that the over emphasis on growth and its effect would cause the Council to neglect the other areas of the Town which needed work. He concluded by saying that he was leaving office with mixed emotions, that he would miss them, but that he felt there needed to be new people and ideas on the Council. Mayor Nassif thanked the Council for their friendship and presented each of them with a copy of "Chapel Hill, An Illustrated History".

Council Member Thorpe presented Mayor Nassif with a framed photograph of the Mayor when he took his oath of office.

Council Member Howes and Preston read resolutions of appreciation for deceased Council Members Marilyn Myers Boulton and Winston Broadfoot.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOWES MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTIONS OF APPRECIATION FOR MAYOR NASSIF, COUNCIL MEMBER KAWALEC, COUNCIL MEMBER BOULTON AND COUNCIL MEMBER BROADFOOT. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

#### Baucom Rezoning Request

Council Member Godschalk asked if the Council could defer action until the Council reviewed the Manager's report on conditional use zoning. Attorney Karpinos replied that the Council could defer the item, but that conditional use zoning could have different regulations with regard to the application process so that the applicant might have to go through an application process all over again.

COUNCIL MEMBER PASQUINI MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-219.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOWES MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER THORPE FOR A SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO REFER TO THE MANAGER PENDING FURTHER INFORMATION ON CONDITIONAL USE ZONING.

Council Member Pasquini felt the delay would not help the applicant and felt it would just place his application on hold indefinitely. He asked the Manager when the staff expected to have a report ready on conditional use zoning. Manager Taylor replied that the staff report would probably be in the spring with potential Council action in the fall.

THE SUBSTITUTE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

#### Brenner Rezoning Request

Council Member Smith asked if the applicant was aware that he could apply to rezone for Office/Institutional-1. Manager Taylor replied that a copy of the memorandum had been sent to the applicant.

Council Member Preston asked if there were any time advantage of either applying for OI-1 rezoning or modifying the Special Use Permit. Roger Waldon, Planning Director, replied that either request would have to come before Council in a public hearing and that the earliest it could be scheduled would be in March. Council Member Preston asked if this meant the applicant would not have to wait a year to apply for an OI-1 rezoning request. Mr. Waldon replied that the applicant would not have to wait a year.

Council Member Howes asked if the Attorney felt the applicant would not have to wait a year. Attorney Karpinos stated that having further reviewed the Development Ordinance and the General Statutes, he felt there was enough differences between NC and OI so that a year's wait was not needed.

Council Member Godschalk said if the Council agreed to modify the existing Special Use Permit it would have the authority to exempt the property from certain provisions. Attorney Karpinos agreed that this was true, but stated that he had received a letter from the applicant's attorney stating that the applicant did not wish to modify the special use permit.

COUNCIL MEMBER PASQUINI MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-220. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

The resolution, as adopted, reads as follows:

A RESOLUTION DENYING AN APPLICATION FOR REZONING (85-R-220)

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Town of Chapel Hill that it hereby denies the application of William E. Brenner and William E. Brenner, Jr. to rezone the property identified as Chapel Hill Township Tax Map 77, Block B, Lot 17, located on the northwest corner of East Franklin Street and Elizabeth Street, from Residential-2 to Neighborhood Commercial. The legal description of the property is as follows:

BEGINNING at an iron stake in the Northern property line of the Old Chapel Hill-Durham Road, now known as Holloway Street, and the Eastern property line of Elizabeth Street; running thence from said beginning point along the line of Elizabeth Street North 55 degrees 5 minutes West 128 feet to an iron stake in the drive of the H. C. Holloway property; running thence with along and with the Southeastern property line of said drive North 39 degrees West 99 feet to an iron stake, said stake being in the line of the property formerly owned by Eva Kate Burks; thence with said property line South 55 dgrees 5 minutes East 123 feet to an iron stake in the Northern boundary line of the Old Chapel Hill-Durham Road South 35 degrees West 100 feet to an iron stake, the place and point of BEGINNING, and being a portion of the tract conveyed to Edward C. Burks by H. C. Holloway, Sr., et ux by deed dated April 15, 1946, recorded in the Office of the Register of Deeds of Orange County in Book 124 at page 352 and being a portion of the tract conveyed by Edward C. Burk et ux to North Carolina State Highway and Public Works Commission by deed dated June 14, 1951, and recorded in the Office of the Register of Deeds of Orange County in Book 137 at page 100.

The reason for this action is that the Council fails to find that:

- a) the proposed amendment would correct a manifest error;
- b) the proposed amendment is appropriate due to changed or changing conditions; or
- c) the proposed amendment achieves the purposes of the Comprehensive Plan.

This the 25th day of November, 1985.

#### Wilco Service Station

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Roger Waldon, Planning Director, made a brief presentation on the revised plan submitted by the applicant. He said the applicant had made changes in the size of the building (increase from 2400 to 4200 square feet), added 7 more parking spaces, increased the size of the island along Airport Road, and added plantings. He said the changes proposed were relatively minor except for the increase in building size. This change if kept, he felt, necessitated reopening the public hearing.

Mayor Nassif reminded the Council that evidence pertaining to this item was considered in a public hearing, therefore, new renderings displayed that evening should not be taken into consideration.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOWES MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER PASQUINI TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-179B.

Council Member Preston asked about the appearance of the proposed building. Manager Taylor responded that the building referred to in the resolution would be only 2400 square feet, but he would expect it to look similar to the developer's renderings.

Council Member Pasquini expressed concern that the proposed site plan was not the one Council was proposing to adopt.

Council Member Smith expressed concern about requiring the type "D" buffer.

COUNCIL MEMBER SMITH MOVED A SUBSTITUTE MOTION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-179C. THE MOTION FAILED FOR LACK OF A SECOND.

Council Members Preston and Godschalk expressed concern over the type and width of the buffer. Council Member Preston asked if the gasoline tanks would have to be moved if the required buffer were placed in the site plan. Manager Taylor responed that the above ground gasoline pumps would need to be moved, but he could not answer whether or not the underground tanks would be required to be moved.

THE MOTION CARRIED, 5-3, WITH COUNCIL MEMBERS KAWALEC, NASSIF, AND SMITH VOTING AGAINST.

The resolution, as adopted, reads as follows:

A RESOLUTION APPROVING A MODIFICATION OF UNIFIED BUISNESS DEVELOP-MENT SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR WILCO FOOD MART (85-R-179)

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Town of Chapel Hill that the Council hereby finds that the Modification of Unified Business Development Special Use Permit proposed by Mr. A. T. Williams for a service station/convenience store on property identified as Chapel Hill Tax Map 24, Lot 40, if developed in accordance with the site plan dated November 13, 1985 and the conditions set forth below:

- Would be located, designed, and proposed to be operated so as to maintain or promote the public health, safety, and general welfare;
- Would comply with all required regulations and standards of the Development Ordinance, including all applicable provisions of Articles 4, 5 and 6, and the applicable specific standards contained in Sections 8.7 and 8.8, and with all other applicable regulations;
- 3. Would be located, designed, and proposed to be operated so as to maintain or enhance the value of contiguous property; and
- 4. Would conform with the general plans for the physical development of the Town as embodied in the Development Ordinance and in the Comprehensive Plan.

These findings are conditioned on the following:

1. That construction begin by November 25, 1986 and be completed by November 25, 1987.

- 2. That one-half of a 65-foot-wide roadway with curb and gutter and sidewalk be provided along the site's frontage with Airport Road.
- 3. That curb and gutter be provided along the driveway entrances and along the edges of the parking areas.
- 4. That the width of the southern driveway entrance be reduced to 36 feet by extending the median between the two driveway entrances southward.
- 5. That all outdoor lighting be designed and installed to provide direct Illumination only within the property boundaries. Such lighting shall be shown on a detailed lighting plan and shall be approved by the Appearance Commission prior to the issuance of a Zoning Compliance Permit.
- That structures and measures for protection of existing trees during construction be provided before commencement of grading or construction.
- 7. That a Type D buffer be provided along the site's frontage on Airport Road.
- 8. That the detailed utility plan be approved by OWASA, Duke Power, Southern Bell and the Town Manager before issuance of a Zoning Compliance Permit.
- 9. That final plans to be approved by the Town Manager before issuance of a Zoning Compliance Permit (detailed site plan, utility plan, grading and stormwater management plan, and right-ofway/easement plats) conform to the approved preliminary plans and demonstrate compliance with the above conditions and the design standards of the Development Ordinance and the Design Manual.
- 10. That the type of Special Use is hereby redesignated a Service Station rather than a Unified Business Development.
- 11. That the building constructed on the site not exceed 2400 square feet in size.
- 12. If any conditions shall be held invalid or void, then this permit shall be void and of no effect.
- 13. The continued validity and effectiveness of this permit is expressly conditioned upon compliance with or fulfillment of these conditions, and upon compliance with application provisions of the Chapel Hill Development Ordinance and regulations thereunder.
- 14. That except as modified herein, all other special terms, conditions and stipulations heretofore made applicable to the Special Use Permit be continued in effect.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council hereby approves a Modification of Unified Business Development Special Use Permit in accord with the plans and conditions listed above.

## Payment-in-Lieu of Recreation Area

COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER KAWALEC TO ADOPT ORDINANCE 85-0-77A.

Mayor Nassif expressed concern that the term "immediate area" would be construed by developers and property owners to be near or adjacent to their property. Manager Taylor replied that the Town Attorney had been in contact with the Attorney General's Office and offices at the N.C. League of Municipalities regarding this issue and had found that the intent of the law was that the definition of "immediate area" should be left to the discretion of the local governments. He said the staff recommended using the classifications of parks and the radius of population they serve as outlined in the Community Facilities Report to define immediate area. Council Member Smith also expressed concern over the definition of "immediate area".

THE MOTION CARRIED, 5-3 WITH COUNCIL MEMBERS NASSIF, SMITH AND THORPE VOTING AGAINST.

The ordinance requires a second reading.

Closing of an Unnamed Right-of-Way West of Hamilton Road

COUNCIL MEMBER SMITH MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER KAWALEC TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-221A. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

The resolution, as adopted, reads as follows:

A RESOLUTION APPROVING CLOSURE OF AN UNNAMED RIGHT-OF-WAY WEST OF HAMILTON ROAD, BETWEEN ROUTE 54 AND PRESTWICK ROAD (85-R-221A)

WHEREAS, the development plans for the "Glenwood Village Shopping Center" have been approved by the Chapel Hill Planning Board on November 4, 1985, and;

WHEREAS, such plans assume that this right-of-way would be closed, and;

WHEREAS, whether or not said shopping center is constructed, the right-of-way in question is unnecessary and undesirable for public roadway purposes, and;

WHEREAS, no individual(s) owning property in the vicinity would be deprived of reasonable means of ingress and egress to his or her property, and closing the right-of-way would not be contrary to the public interest;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Town of Chapel Hill that the Council hereby approves the permanent closure for roadway purposes of an unnamed, unopened portion of right-of-way approximately sixty (60) feet wide and three hundred seventy (370) feet long, extending between N.C. Route 54 and Prestwick Road approximately one hundred seventy (170) feet west of Hamilton Road, to be effective upon fulfillment of the following conditions as set forth below:

That the plat for "Glenwood Village Shopping Center" is duly recorded in accordance with the approved site plan, and;

That a blanket utility and drainage easement remain with the property in question, for possible future needs by the Town and/or public utilities.

This the 25th day of November, 1985.

#### Chandler's Green - Response to Petition of Mel Rashkis

Mayor Nassif asked how the staff determined that Sweeten Creek Road should be a collector street. Roger Waldon replied that comparing the design specifications for collector streets closely met the traffic volume expectations of Sweeten Creek Road.

Council Member Godschalk stated he felt the street should not be designated as a collector street and the standards for a Class "A" residential street were more appropriate to be applied to this proposed road.

COUNCIL MEMBER PASQUINI MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GODSCHALK TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-222B. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

The resolution, as adopted, reads as follows:

A RESOLUTION CALLING FOR SWEETEN CREEK ROAD TO BE CONSIDERED A LOCAL CLASS "A" STREET, CONSTRUCTED TO CLASS "A" STANDARDS (33') (85-R-222b)

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Town of Chapel Hill that Sweeten Creek Road, a street in the Chandler's Green Subdivision approved by Council on October 14, 1985, is of a nature and character that make it appropriate to classify it as a Local Class "A" street; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Council directs the Town Manager to require that Sweeten Creek Road be constructed to standards for a Local Class "A" street, as described in the Town's Design Manual, including a thirty-three foot (33') roadway width and turn lanes at major intersections, and a sixty foot (60') right of way width.

This the 25th day of November, 1985.

## Major Capital Needs: Public Library Expansion, Southern Park and Fire Station, and Municipal Meeting Room/Office Space

Joe Herzenberg, speaking as a member of the Library Board of Trustees, said that he disagreed with the Board's recommendation regarding Library expansion, feeling that a downtown site would be more accessible and the present facility should not be maintained as a branch library because it would not be economical.

Ms. Lisa Price, speaking as the Chair of the Library Board of Trustees, said the Board recommended expansion of the Library through the addition of a new main library away from the Town Center feeling it would be more accessible, provide better parking, and reduce traffic congestion downtown. She introduced the Library Board's evaluations of the potential downtown sites suggested by the Manager in his report and stated the Board rated the sites lower than the Manager. She also presented the Board's rating of property near the intersection of Airport Road and Estes Drive. She said the Board further recommended maintaining the present Library as a branch facility and retaining the Bookmobile as a mobile branch of the Library. (For a complete text of Ms. Price's comments, see the Clerk's files)

Council Member Smith suggested that the Council and the Library Board seek input from as many Town citizens as possible on this issue since it proposed to be an extremely expensive matter if adopted.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOWES MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GODSCHALK TO RECEIVE THE REPORT AND REFER TO THE MANAGER. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

Manager Taylor said he believed the issues of the Library had been placed before Council and the staff looked forward to direction from Council on the location , timing, and size of the Library.

Manager Taylor also stated that with regard to a southern park and fire station the staff did not have a specific site for Council to consider but that they were working on it, feeling it was still an important issue. He commented that the space needs report of the Old Police Building was included and that he would answer any questions.

COUNCIL MEMBER SMITH MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON TO REFER TO THE MANAGER. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY (8-0).

## Colony Woods Drainage Report

Mayor Nassif said that he had nothing new to report but that he was waiting word from Durham County regarding the situation in Colony Woods. He felt the Town should replace the drainage pipes if no agreement could be arranged with Durham County.

### Housing Authority

Mayor Nassif said that he felt that since the Federal Government would be greatly reducing the amount of funds it gives for low income housing assistance, the Town should consider bringing the Chapel Hill Housing Authority into the Town as a separate department with its own budget and under the control of the Manager. He encouraged Council to seriously consider this action.

### 15-501 Bypass Improvements

Mayor Nassif said that he had been working diligently to get the date for improvements to 15-501 Bypass moved up. He said conversations with Mr. Buchanan of NCDOT led him to believe that the Council needed to offer to pay for the pre-construction work involved in the hope that NCDOT would move the construction date forward. He urged Council to authorize him to send a letter to NCDOT suggesting the Town undertake the pre-construction work.

Manager Taylor said that from his conversations with NCDOT it appeared that the cost for planning, environmental impact, and design engineering, for the entire section of bypass around Chapel Hill and Carrboro would be around \$900,000 (approximately \$500,000 within the Town's jurisdiction), and that he felt the letter to DOT would help the Town achieve their goal of getting the bypass widened.

COUNCIL MEMBER PRESTON MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER HOWES TO AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR TO SEND A LETTER TO NCDOT SUGGESTING THE TOWN PERFORM THE PRE-CONSTRUCTION WORK ON WIDENING AND IMPROVING 15-501 BYPASS. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY (8-0).

Council Member Thorpe asked that a copy of the letter be sent to Mr. Buchanan.

## University Lake and Cane Creek Watershed Classifications

Mayor Nassif said that the State had recently changed its water quality classifications to WS-II or III allowing for degradation of water in Cane Creek and University Lake by permitting point source discharges. He asked Council to authorize him to send a letter to the Department of Natural Resources requesting that both basins be classified WS-1, thereby maintaining its present classification.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOWES MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GODSCHALK TO AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR TO SEND A LETTER TO THE DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES REQUESTING THAT THE WATER CLASSIFICATION IN CANE CREEK AND UNIVERSITY LAKE BE WS-I. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

## Report on OWASA

Mayor Nassif stated that he had met with the Executive Director of OWASA, along with the Mayor and Manager of Carrboro, the Chapel Hill Manager, and the Orange County Chairman and Manager regarding extension of water and sewer service to areas outside of the county. He said it appeared that OWASA was willing to agree not to extend service without consulting with the adjacent governmental bodies regarding potential problems with storm water runoff, etc. Mayor Nassif said that the lines of communication had been opened and it was up to the Council to keep them open. He stated that he was of the opinion that there needed to be automatic seats on the OWASA Board of Directors for the Mayors of Chapel Hill and Carrboro and the Chairman of the County Commissioners so that they might give their Boards' direct input into OWASA matters.

#### Merger Study of Chapel Hill and Carrboro

Mayor Nassif said that he and Mayor Porto of Carrboro would like the governing bodies of each Town to endorse the merger study of Chapel Hill and Carrboro.

COUNCIL MEMBER KAWALEC MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER SMITH TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-223. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

The resolution, as adopted, reads as follows:

A RESOLUTION ENDORSING A STUDY OF MERGING THE TOWNS OF CHAPEL HILL AND CARRBORO (85-R-223)

WHEREAS, the issue of merging Chapel Hill and Carrboro has been discussed in the community for some time; and

WHEREAS, the Mayors of the Towns of Chapel Hill and Carrboro have supported and the Editor of the Chapel Hill Newspaper has raised private funds for a study to determine the advantages, disadvantages and cost implications of merging the two Towns;

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Town of Chapel Hill that the Council hereby endorses a study of the advantages and disadvantages of merging the Towns of Chapel Hill and Carrboro.

This the 25th day of November, 1985.

Transit Services Between UNC and the Town

Manager Taylor reported that this item was a written memorandum representing the verbal agreement between the Town and the University regarding their cooperation with a transit system and how costs for its operation should be shared.

Council Member Howes asked Manager Taylor if the University had seen this proposal and were in agreement with it. Manager Taylor replied yes.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOWES MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GODSCHALK TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 85-R-224. THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY, (8-0).

Council Member Pasquini asked for clarification on the Transportation Board's comments regarding the cost allocation formula.

The resolution, as adopted, reads as follows:
